# COURSE GOALS

To gain knowledge and skills related to the following aspects of teaching: historical foundations of American education, major educational philosophies, various levels of education, political influences on education, current trends and reforms in education, education in a multicultural society, the public's attitudes and concerns regarding public education, effective teacher and school research, school and society, funding education, law and the schools, and teaching as a profession.

## MAJOR OBJECTIVES

Describe the historical foundations of education Describe the major philosophies of education Describe the various levels of education (early childhood, elementary, middle school, high school, & higher education) Discuss various political influences on education Discuss current trends and reforms in education Discuss education in our multicultural society Discuss the public's attitudes and concerns regarding American public education (Gallup Poll) Describe effective teacher and school research Describe selected social forces and issues affecting public education (youth suicide, alcohol, drug abuse, child abuse, teen pregnancy) Discuss important court decisions and laws involving public schools Discuss the financing of public schools Discuss teaching as a profession (current supply/demand, certification, tenure, collective bargaining, NEA/AFT, laws, compensation, and teacher rights)

# 1. ATTENDANCE AND CLASS PARTICIPATION

Regular class attendance and active class participation (including current events) are important requirements of this course and will constitute 20% of your final grade.

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## 2. CLASSROOM/SCHOOL OBSERVATIONS

Since one of the major course requirements is forty (40) hours of classroom/school observations, you will be assigned to an elementary, middle, or high school for the semester. However, at least three of your hours must be observing another level of education. A timesheet will be maintained at your school site, and all hours must be completed by May 1, 1996. This timesheet must be signed by your teacher and the school principal and turned in so you may receive credit in this course. You will be expected to turn in a classroom map, a teacher-student interaction form, an interview with a teacher or administrator, and a lesson plan which you will present to your class.

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# 3. JOURNAL

You are to submit a journal (using a 1-2", three-ring binder) of your educational experiences during your classroom/school observations. Entries should be dated, include your hours, and significant experiences. Your journal should also include your written critiques of the assigned educational articles, current events, and other written assignments described above.

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#### 4. MIDTERM

The midterm will consist of objective questions and short essays from the textbook, lectures, and class discussions related to the historical foundations of education, the major educational philosophies, the levels of education, political influences on education, education in a multicultural society, and current trends and reforms in education.

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### 5. FINAL EXAMINATION

The format of the final examination will be discussed in class on March 18, 1996. Our final is scheduled for Monday, May 13, 1996, from 6:00-7:50 p.m.
