- 1. WESTERN CIVILIZATION TO THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY IS A COURSE DESIGNED TO COVER THE HISTORY OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION FROM ITS PREHISTORIC BEGINNINGS TO THE 17TH CENTURY. WE WILL BE EXAMINING THE MAJOR SOCIAL, CULTURAL, AND POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION DURING THIS PERIOD IN AN EFFORT TO UNDERSTAND HOW OUR CIVILIZATION HAS DEVELOPED AND HOW IT MAY CHANGE IN THE FUTURE.
- 2. THE OBJECTIVE IS FOR YOU TO BE ABLE TO:
 - 1. DESCRIBE THE EVOLUTION OF NEAR EASTERN CIVILIZATION FROM PREHISTORIC TIMES TO THE EMERGENCE OF MESOPOTAMIA AND EGYPT.
 - 2. DESCRIBE THE DEVELOPMENT OF POLITICAL, ECONOMIC, AND CULTURAL SYSTEMS FUNDAMENTAL TO WESTERN CIVILIZATION FROM ANCIENT TIMES TO THE 17TH CENTURY.
 - 3. IDENTIFY IMPORTANT GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS RELATED TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF WESTERN HISTORY FROM ANCIENT TIMES TO THE 1600'S.
 - 4. ANALYZE RELIGIOUS BELIEFS AND MOVEMENTS PERTAINING TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION UP TO THE 17TH CENTURY.
 - 5. ANALYZE THE INTERPLAY AND EXCHANGE BETWEEN NON-WESTERN CIVILIZATIONS AND THE WEST LEADING UP TO THE 1600'S.
 - 6. DESCRIBE THE SPREAD OF WESTERN ECONOMICS, CULTURAL, AND POLITICAL INFLUENCE THROUGH EXPLORATION AND COLONIZATION DURING THE 15TH, 16TH AND 17TH CENTURIES.
 - 7. EVALUATE IDEAS AND INTELLECTUAL TRENDS WHICH HAVE INFLUENCED THE DEVELOPMENT OF WESTERN CULTURE UP TO THE 1600'S.

- 8. IDENTIFY AND ASSESS THE IMPORTANCE OF PROMINENT PERSONS, PLACES, AND EVENTS FROM ANCIENT TIMES TO THE 1600'S.
- 9. COMPARE AND CONTRAST INTELLECTUAL, POLITICAL, ECONOMIC, AND SOCIAL EVENTS OF THE PAST WITH EVENTS TAKING PLACE IN CONTEMPORARY SOCIETY.
- 3. GRADING: ALL EXAMS ARE WORTH 100 POINTS EXCEPT THE FINAL. THE FINAL IS WORTH 200 POINTS WITH ONE HUNDRED MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS.
 - A. (600 POINTS) <u>6 TESTS</u>: MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS WORTH 2 POINTS EACH. THE LOWEST TEST SCORE OF THE FIRST 5 TESTS WILL BE THROWN OUT. TESTS MUST BE TAKEN ON SCANTRON FORM 888-E, AND YOU MUST USE A #2 PENCIL. MAKE SURE YOU WRITE YOUR NAME ON YOUR EXAM AND ON YOUR SCANTRON AND THAT YOU PUT YOUR TEST VERSION ON YOUR SCANTRON.
 - B. (100 POINTS) <u>PAPER</u>: YOUR PAPER MUST BE TYPED WITH A MINIMUM 5 PAGE BODY. YOU WILL BE GRADED ON FORM (15%), TYPING (15%), AND CONTENT (70%). DO YOUR OWN WORK--DON'T PLAGIARIZE.

YOUR PAPER IS DUE ON OR BEFORE MONDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 1996, AT THE BEGINNING OF CLASS. MAKE SURE YOU USE THE FOLLOWING FORM: TITLE PAGE MUST BE CENTERED BOTH VERTICALLY AND HORIZONTALLY. THE FIRST PAGE OF THE BODY MUST HAVE A 2" TOP MARGIN WITH 1" SIDE AND BOTTOM MARGINS. ALL SUBSEQUENT PAGES MUST HAVE 1" MARGINS ALL AROUND AND A PAGE NUMBER IN THE UPPER RIGHT HAND CORNER. YOU MUST ALSO HAVE A BIBLIOGRAPHY OR WORKS CITED PAGE. THE BODY OF THE PAPER MUST BE DOUBLE SPACED WITH 5 SPACE PARAGRAPH INDENTIONS. LATE PAPERS MAY BE TURNED IN TO ME PERSONALLY FOR A SCORE OF ½ OF WHAT IS EARNED. A LATE PAPER WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED BEYOND TWO WEEKS AFTER THE DUE DATE.
