Essays: You will write two essays for this class. Both essays will be literary critical essays: you will <u>not</u> be writing book reports. We will be talking about this distinction as the semester progresses. Essays must without exception be typed and include a cover page with your name, my name, the course, the date, and the class time. Please double space and leave ample margins. I dislike fancy folders and covers; a staple in the upper left-hand corner is sufficient. Your essays will not be accepted without rough drafts. They will also not be accepted without proper use of the MLA parenthetical citation form, which I will review in class.

Exams: You will have a mid-term and final. Both exams will be essay exams which will require specific and thoughtful responses to focused questions.

Late papers: Your grade for a late paper will be reduced by one letter. Late papers will not be accepted unless I have been forewarned and have agreed to give an extension. Papers will not be accepted if they are more than one week late.

Make-up Exams: There are no make-ups unless I have been informed beforehand as to why you will miss.

Grades: Your final grade will be an average of the exams and the essays. That means that the four grades will be added together and divided by four. If you fail to submit a paper or take an exam, you will receive a zero for that work and a zero will be averaged in to your final grade.

Attendance: I will drop you from the course if you miss more than six hours of class time.

Reading: Please keep up with the reading in order to avoid forcing me into having to give dumb and time-wasting Vanna White quizzes. If I do give dumb quizzes because you're not reading reliably, they'll be averaged together and then averaged in to your final grade.
