Studio Rules and Procedures

- 1. Purchase the following materials and equipment. (Kit is available at the bookstore)
 - Elephant ear sponge or synthetic sponge
 - Dissecting needle
 - 5 inexpensive paint brushes from 3/4" flat to fine point
 - Large cellulose sponge (clean-up)
 - Patter's rib
 - 2-trimming tools
 - 2-large plastic bowls
 - 1-8"plastic bowl with lid (butter container)
 - Small package of sandpaper and steel wool
 - 1-14" cutting wire or fishing line
 - 1 gallon bucket
- 2. Mark every piece of equipment with your initials or monogram.
- 3. Text available (not mandatory), <u>The Craft of Pottery</u>, by Casson.

 Students are also encouraged to read available ceramic periodicals at the library and in class. (Ceramics Monthly)
- 4. Purchase a notebook. Keep a detailed record of your ceramic activities. This will be submitted to your instructor at the end of the course and will form the basis for part of your grade.
- 5. Clay and glazes will be purchased by the Art Department through payment of a \$5.00 fee. This fee will cover 25 lbs. of clay, glazing materials and firing costs. If you wish to purchase clay elsewhere you will be charged .25 lb. for firing. Every effort must be made to keep earthenware and stoneware clays separate. It would be disastrous to include earthenware in a stoneware glaze firing. For this reason every earthenware piece must be clearly marked.

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- 6. Please adhere to the following studio rules to insure a clean and orderly work place.
 - All student materials and equipment will be stored by the student with the exception of pottery waiting to be fired, pottery drying in the damp room or finished pieces that are stored in the counter cupboards.
 - All department equipment that is used by the students will be cleaned and replaced to their proper places.
 - Before leaving the studio every student will clean his/her wheel and work area (including floor).
 - Slip and slurry from throwing will NOT be poured down the sink but must be poured into the class barrel. Students who wish to salvage their slip may use the plaster tables intended for that purpose.
 - Students must pick up pottery pieces after they have been fired. LEAVE THEM AT YOUR OWN RISK.
- 7. Students wishing to use the studio for out of class work will schedule themselves for the hour, day and wheel on schedules prepared for this purpose. Not more than 3 extra hours per week may be scheduled by any student. The privilege of out of class scheduling will be withdrawn for any student who leaves his work area unclean or disorderly.
- 8. HELP PROTECT OTHER STUDENTS WORK AS WELL AS YOUR OWN BY HANDLING ONLY YOUR OWN PROJECTS.
