Course Description:

This course is designed to introduce students to the historical, contemporary and technical study of painting techniques. Included in this course are exercises, projects, extended paintings, classroom drawings and paintings, homework drawings and paintings, class lectures, reading assignments, class discussions, individual and group critiques. Both traditional and experimental approaches to painting will be explored throughout the semester study.

Course Objectives:

- 1. To develop skills and competency in the use of painting materials.
- 2. To inform the student through slide shows and discussion, the types of paintings that have been done historically.
- 3. To develop the student's ability to evaluate their own work as well as the works of others.

Studio Environment:

The studio is a <u>serious</u> learning environment. It is required that students listen attentively to lectures, become actively engaged in the painting process, explore creative ideas and inspirations, work diligently toward the mastery of technical skills through repetition and <u>hard work</u>.

The skill of painting takes considerable dedication and discipline. The classroom is a **serious studio environment**. Consideration and respect for the learning process is a requirement. Conversation that is not related to the course should be kept to an absolute minimum.

Attendance Policy

Attendance is an important aspect of the student's grade. Students are expected to attend all sessions of classes for which they are enrolled. Only very serious, well-documented, emergencies are acceptable as excused absences. Excused absences include illness, other medical problems, or family emergencies. (Personal business or other appointments are not excused.) Students must provide the excuse for the absence the first day of return following the absence. An excuse can not be granted unless you inform the instructor as soon as it occurs.

After 4 absences, the attendance grade will be dropped one grade for each class missed.

DO NOT COME TO CLASS LATE. If a student is late three times it equals one absence. If a student is late more than 20 minutes he/she is ABSENT.

DO NOT LEAVE CLASS EARLY. If a student leaves class early, he/she is marked absent.

As stated on page 22 of the *Reedley College Catalog*, "Any student who misses more than two weeks of class meetings may be dropped." Two weeks of class equals four class meetings.

Drawing Paper Pad

Good white drawing paper

(It must be 18" x 24"). Buy one sheet for every day of class.

Gesso

One half-gallon

Large Cheap gesso brush

2 inches

Plywood board, 1/4", at least 19 x 25"

It must be plywood, other materials will warp and may not accept staples.

This board should be purchased at a lumber yard or hardware.

The store will cut a piece to size.

Plexiglass Palette

1/4", at least 16 x 20"

This can be purchased at a glass shop

Paper towels

Very absorbent only

Cotton Rags

Several rags will be used

This is very important for oil and acrylic painters

Tuna Can (oil painters only)

Glass jar with a lid (oil painters only)

The size of apple sauce, 8 oz

Painting knife (also called palette knife)

One or more of various shapes

Buy only those with an elbow bend between the handle and the knife

Roll of unprimed canvas

The rolls vary in size, usually they are 6' x 6' or more. You will need at least 6' x 6' of canvas and probably more. (Some of you will be experimenting with very large canvas sizes)

Stretcher Bars

You will need at least 12 Sizes should be at least 16 x 20" or larger Sizes will vary according to preference and experience.

Brushes

Make sure you are buying long handled hog hair oil brushes. Do not buy watercolor brushes The more expensive the brush the better its quality.

A cheap brush will drive you absolutely crazy. Buy the best brushes you can afford.

I suggest you buy 8 brushes. (If you can't, buy at least 5)

Brushes should be #8, #10 or #12.

Do not buy small brushes

Razor blade

Safety retractable single-edge

Mineral Spirits (oil painters only)

*FOR HEALTH REASONS THE MINERAL SPIRITS MUST BE ODORLESS

No other mineral spirits or turpentine will be accepted in the classroom. Acrylic painters will not need this. Purchase a small bucket for water.

Homework sketchbook journal.

At least 20 pages thick Spiral 11 x 16"
