## Class Policy—English 1A—Fall 1999

Objective: College-level skills in reading and writing

**Attendance:** After the sixth absence the student will be dropped.

**Grades:** There will be one test on sentence writing and four out-of-class papers.

The sentence writing test will be objective in nature; the essays will be judged on the basis of style, organization, and content. No essay seriously deficient in the area of mechanics (spelling, grammar, punctuation) will receive a passing grade. The point scale is listed below. In addition, you will write exercises in the computer lab every other class session; they will be graded pass/fail and their total value will be 100 points. A total of 600 points is possible for the semester. Grades will be computed on a strict percentage basis: 540-600=A; 480-539=B; 420-479=C; 360-419=D.

**Plagiarism:** Use of another's work as though it were your own will not be tolerated.

Extra Credit: During the course of the semester there will be several readings sponsored

by Reedley College and the Fresno Poets Association. Following your attendance at a reading you must turn in a response sheet to receive as many as ten points per reading. You may earn as many as forty extra credit

points. I will give you notice of dates and times.

Paper Format: All out-of-class papers will be typed, double-spaced. Use of word

processors outside of class is acceptable and encouraged.

#### Diagnostic Writing Assignment (50 points)

Read "Fenstad's Mother" and "Gryphon" on the attached handouts. Respond to *one* of the following prompts in a three-page (typed, double-spaced) essay:

- [A] In "Fenstad's Mother" the two main characters seem to be opposites of one another. What areas of conflict between mother and son are explored?
- [B] In "Gryphon" the narrator defends Miss Ferenczi against the accusation that she's crazy. Why does he do that? What does she represent in the context of his life?

Provide a thesis that is a direct response to the prompt. You should provide at least three distinct and identifiable points. Use quotations to support your ideas; however the quotations should be short (no more than two lines long) and documented as follows:

Quotations are the exact words of a writer or speaker. They are marked by quotation marks and documented by an in-text citation that is included within the sentence in which the quotation occurs. When writing about a single story or novel, the in-text citation only needs to include the page number where the quotation can be found. Look at the following example:

Although Fenstad's discussion of logic is dry, impersonal, and without much passion, we are reminded that "...his mother had always liked smoke-filled rooms, where ideas fought each other, and where some of those ideas died" (4).

I will be evaluating this essay in the following ways:

- mechanics (spelling, punctuation, grammar)
- sentence structure (variety of construction, rhythm, lengths)
- diction (appropriateness of vocabulary)
- organization of ideas (a statement of thesis; three distinct and identifiable reasons)
