Course Syllabus

Objective:

This class is designed to further develop your skills in composition, skills that will benefit your work throughout the university, by advancing the concepts introduced in previous courses in writing.

Atter ance:

Attendance is mandatory. You are allowed four (4) absences without your grade being affected. A fifth absence means you can receive a grade no higher than a 'C'. A sixth absence means you cannot pass the class. There are no 'excused' absences, so use them wisely.

Late/Missed Work:

Late work will not be accepted. If you cannot make a class meeting, please arrange for someone to bring your work to class prior to its being let out (I will excuse interruptions by any couriers).

There are no make-ups for missed work. Any missed assignment, for example a missed quiz, constitutes lost points. Also, it is your responsibility to contact either me or a classmate to ensure you have not missed an assignment due to absence.

Reading:

Good writers are good readers; improving your reading ability, your ability to look at others' works critically and analytically, will invariably improve your writing. Please keep in mind: you are not required to "get it" upon finishing a reading assignment. Class time will be devoted to refining ideas about meaning and discussing questions about content and structure. Approximately 30 pages of reading will be assigned a week.

Responses:

Periodically you will be required to respond formally to readings, including those of your peers' work, and discuss them in both a small and large group forum. Responses will be a minimum of 1 double-spaced typed page (12 font, Times New Roman, 1 inch margins on all sides). These will be worth 10 points each; 10 points will be given for meeting the minimum requirements, 5 for completing anything short of the minimum requirements, and 0 for doing aught.

At other times I will be giving short essay quizzes on the readings. To prepare for these we will have a sample quiz prior to the first one that will be assessed for a grade.
