### **SYLLABUS**

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Development of writing process, revising and finishing short papers, including logical development and organization of ideas. Emphasizes avoiding common writing errors, develops reading skills by reading model essays and analyzing rhetorical strategies. There will be emphasis on each class meeting as a writing lab; therefore, attendance is not only mandatory, but irreplaceable. Grades will be based on attendance, class participation, quizzes on mechanics, journal output of 1000 words a week, ten drafts and six writings brought to completion, utilizing the Writing Process. An English 25 Portfolio composed of the student's best work will be presented at the final.
