Course Description: This course is designed to help you develop the specific reading skills, abilities, and strategies that will enable you to deal with college-level reading material more effectively, efficiently, and independently. It is designed to not only make you a better reader but a better thinker.

Grading: English 62 is a three-unit course. The class is offered on a graded basis with a credit/no credit option. Your grade will be based on test performance, successful completion of all assignments (on time), class participation, attendance, and punctuality. A percentage point system will be used so that students can stay apprised of their progress in fulfilling the course requirement. It is every student's responsibility to collect all graded, returned work, and maintain an accurate account of all grades on the <u>Student Grade Record</u>.

Except by pre-arrangement or unusual cases of illness or family distress, <u>late</u>
<u>assignments are not accepted.</u> These late assignments (that have been approved by the instructor) must be completed by the <u>next class after your return,</u> or a zero will be entered for the assignment.

Included in the final grade are:

Attendance: Regular attendance is required for this class, and students are responsible for their own attendance and their own work. Regularly means that you attend every class, prepare homework <u>before class</u> (not during), read and study assigned work <u>before class</u>, and be prepared to participate by asking questions about that which you don't understand, and by answering questions asked of you by the instructor.

Absences from class make success very difficult; they lower your grade through missed Daily Work. It is always your responsibility to come to class prepared even after an absence. This means that you will have to find out what was assigned during your absence before you return to class. Two tardies (arrivals in class after instruction has begun) are equivalent to one absence. If you have five absences by the end of the ninth week, you will be dropped from the course at the instructor's discretion.

Final examination: All students must take the final examination to receive credit in the course. Except in unusual cases of illness or family distress, final examinations will be adminstered only according to the "Spring Schedule" found on page 103 of the *Spring 2000 Reedley College Class Schedule*. The time and date of the final exam will not be changed to accommodate holiday or travel arrangements or employment schedules.
