Course Objectives: In the process of completing this course, students will:

- A. Listen to low-beginning materials on familiar topics from a variety of sources.
- B. Listen and identify global and discrete meaning.
- C. Converse on everyday social and familiar topics.
- D. Identify and use patterns of intonation and pronunciation.

Course Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- A. Listen and understand spoken English at the low-beginning level.
- B. Communicate orally at the low-beginning level.
