Attendance and Class Activities	Although this class is fully online, it has been set up on a Monday, Wednesday, Friday basis. Lectures, reading assignments, discussion activities, and writing assignments will become available a day ahead of each class session. The degree to which you are successful in this class will be a direct reflection of how seriously you take each of these assignments and activities. If you miss more than three assignments within the first nine class sessions, you will be dropped.
Discussions	<p>The Discussion Board is where the ongoing learning of the class takes place, and as such we want to grant it the importance it is due. Please take note of the following observations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First, unlike discussion in a traditional classroom, you have the opportunity to think carefully and deeply about the things that you “say” on the Discussion Board without the constraint of time pressure or the concern of whether or not your voice will be heard over the voices of others; you also have the opportunity to edit your remarks. Please take advantage of those opportunities. • Second, because this is an academic environment, please do not consider the Discussion Board as analogous to text messaging, instant messaging, or e-mail to friends. Your comments should be grammatical and mechanically sound with regards to spelling and punctuation. • Third, your role on the discussion board is to talk with each other about the reading. While we will be starting the conversation with questions, we hope that you will address your comments to each other. Make this a meaningful conversation rather than a make-work activity. We will, of course, answer questions that you have about assignments, but we would like for you to use the discussion board as a way of learning from each other. • Fourth, you should respond to each discussion forum that we start (and you will need to respond in order to see the posts of others); you should also interact with at least two of your fellow class members in a thoughtful way. For more about this, please see the following page: A Word about Your Discussion Board Responses. • Finally, remember that while a significant portion of your grade is based upon the quantity, more important are the quality and timeliness of your participation.
Late Papers, Missed Exams	We will accept no late papers unless you have contacted us prior to the deadline posted for the assignment. There will be no make-ups of missed discussion assignments.

Grades	<p>There will be three papers (on short fiction, poetry, and on tragedy in drama); a midterm essay; and a final essay during the course of the semester. The papers and essays will be judged on the basis of style, organization, content, and the degree to which you have followed the directions for the assignment. No essay seriously deficient in the area of mechanics (spelling, grammar, punctuation) will receive a passing grade.</p> <p>There will be approximately fifteen discussion activities assigned throughout this summer semester.</p> <p>The assignment schedule and grade scales are listed below.</p>
Plagiarism	<p>Use of another's work as though it were your own will not be tolerated. In the current Reedley College Catalog, plagiarism is defined as follows:</p> <p>Plagiarism is a specific form of cheating: the use of another's words or ideas without identifying them as such or giving credit to the source. Plagiarism may include, but is not limited to, failing to provide complete citations and references for all work that draws on the ideas, words, or work of others, failing to identify the contributors to work done in collaboration, submitting duplicate work to be evaluated in different courses without the knowledge and consent of the instructors involved, or failing to observe computer security systems and software copyrights.
