Attendance Requirements:

You are expected to attend every class session. Be in class on time. Some class meetings will require that you travel to a site off of the Reedley College Campus including a pack station in the mountains. Unless otherwise notified you should be in class by 9:00am and remain until all equipment is stored, animals have been attended to and cleanup is complete.

Participation will count for 10% of your final grade. Participation points will be deducted for any class that a student misses. You will have 10% out of 100% deducted from your participation grade for each absence. Packing is a physically demanding skill. Tasks will be shared. Students are expected to help each other fairly. The responsibility to drop the course lies with the student.

- Student are responsible for obtaining the notes/handouts and information missed due to an absence from the instructor or fellow student.
- College policy dictates that an instructor should drop a student with two consecutive weeks of unexcused absence.
- At the end of the ninth week of instruction no withdrawals are permitted, and a student must receive a grade.
- Students may be dropped if they miss more than two consecutive class meetings without explanation before week 4.

Required Equipment:

Students are required to have western close toe boots with smooth soles and a wedge heel. Wide or lug-sole boots are not permitted while riding because they are difficult to get out of a stirrup and pose a safety risk. You will not be permitted to ride without proper boots. Long pants/jeans that are loose enough for easy movement are essential. Long sleeve western shirts, boots, a western hat and a belt will be necessary for competition. It is recommended that you use a riding helmet to protect your head while riding animals in the event of a fall. You will be responsible for having your own helmet. Gloves are recommended to protect your hands but are not required.

Laboratory Responsibilities:

You must help with catching and grooming the stock plus cleanup at the conclusion of each class. There is a lot of equipment that must be stored in the tack container, mules must be returned to pastures, and all manure has to be shoveled and hauled. If you leave before the work is done you may lose credit for attendance that day.

Physical Requirements:

This course is physically demanding. It will be necessary for you to walk and run, carry and lift up to 75 pounds of weight, and perform arduous work for at least one hour without a rest

period. However, you should communicate to the instructor any physical limitation you have that may prevent you from safely performing any action asked of you. It is your responsibility to make safe choices for yourself while working with livestock and equipment. If you have any temporary or long-term disability which inhibits your performance or safety, please discuss that with the instructor. The instructor will strive to accommodate your needs. Be prepared for any weather. Class will be held in all conditions outdoors.

Working Safely with Livestock:

Horses and mules weigh up to 1500 pounds and sometimes respond to situations quickly. You should remain aware of the animals' likely actions at all times. You may be removed from a laboratory exercise if the instructor deems it appropriate for your welfare or for the benefit of an animal. You have the right to ask for assistance from the teacher at any time you are concerned for your safety.

Course Description:

Students will develop skills in packing, driving and riding mules and horses. Students will gain experience in handling, feeding, health care and safety. Students will experience riding, packing and driving under arena and trail conditions. Low impact environmental livestock techniques and wilderness etiquette will be learned. The course may involve participation in collegiate competition. (A, CSU)

Learning Objectives:

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. Perform basic horsemanship skills and animal safety.
- 2. Saddle animals, load cargo, and complete two types of rope hitches.
- 3. Identify and define parts of a horse, saddle, pack saddle, packing equipment, and grooming equipment.
- 4. Demonstrate basic knowledge of feeding requirements and emergency care under trail conditions.
- 5. Recite forest regulations for pack strings and camping.
- 6. Drove horses or mules pulling a log or vehicle.
- 7. Participate as a member of collegiate team.

Attendance Policies
