Class Objectives:

- examine the development of political and governmental institutions in the United States from the Reconstruction Era to the present.
- describe the evolution of the American economy after 1865, focusing on America's emergence as a modern industrial society and dominant force in the global economy.
- compare and contrast trends and movements in American social, cultural, and intellectual life from the 1865 to the present.
- trace changes in American social structure as influenced by such factors as urbanization, industrialization, the expansion of suburbs, and the movement toward a post-industrial society in the mid-twentieth century.
- evaluate the contributions, socio-economic conditions and experiences of minority groups and women in the history of the United States from 1865 to the present.
- analyze changes in United States immigration policy as well as the impact of immigration on American society since 1865
- identify the main features and consequences of the United States' foreign policy, focusing on America's emergence as a world power as well as its role in major wars and international conflicts since the 1865.
- Assess the importance of specific prominent persons, places, and events in United States history
- demonstrate the ability to interpret primary and secondary sources, discern between them and to compose an argument which uses them, as appropriate, for support.
