Topics discussed will include the influences of various political, religious and socio-economic events, such as the world wars and scope of world religions, on the development of the visual aesthetics covered within the framework of this course. Comparing and contrasting examples of art, which reflect cultural values from different periods, regions, and often from opposing schools of thought, enhance abilities for critical analysis.
