**Overview** 

Introduction to psychology is intended to familiarize you with some of the basic concepts and principles of psychology. Both theory and practical application are important and will be stressed. This course is intended to provide the student with a sound foundation for further study and a better understanding of him or herself and those with whom he or she comes into contact.

**Objectives** 

The student should be able to demonstrate through tests, discussions, and writings, a knowledge of:

1. Basic vocabulary related to psychology.

Types of research methods.

 Key issues pertaining to such topics as development, motivation/emotion, personality, assessment, disorders, treatment, social psychology, and stress.

4. Current issues, problems, and theories.

5. Influences which affect behavior and their relevance to one's own life.

**Exams** 

Exams will contain information from the lecture notes and the text. All information covered in class and in the text is fair game. Exams will consist of multiple choice, matching, and diagrams.

In Class Assignments

Everyday thereafter a letter grade will continue to be deducted. (It will be very damaging to turn a paper in late, so make sure you stay on top of your assignments!)

Plagiarism is a specific form of cheating. It is defined as the use of another person's published or unpublished ideas or writings without acknowledging the source. In this class cheating will be defined as improving one's grade or gaining course credit by means of trickery or other devices outside of one's own knowledge or efforts.
