Lecture and Text Materials. Both lecture and the textbook will be the primary sources of information for the course. Some material will be introduced in lectures that is not emphasized or presented in the text. Likewise, some material covered in the text will not be presented in lectures. You will be held responsible for all materials, both lecture and text.

Weekly Quizzes: Quizzes will be given at the beginning of class each week, except on the nights when exams are scheduled and the week following the exams. The quizzes will consist of objective questions (multiple choice and true/false). Each quiz will cover the material in the previous week's lecture and corresponding reading assignment. You will be able to drop your two lowest quiz grades when your overall course grade is computed.

<u>Examinations</u>: Exams will be written, essay questions. Exams are designed to help you learn how to apply what you have learned to the real world. Therefore, it is important that you understand the material rather than simply memorize it. Exams will be cumulative only to the extent that some material learned at an earlier point in the course will be applied throughout the course.

<u>Video Assignment</u>: A required video will be shown during Week 9 class period. The video assignment will be handed out in class the night of the video. After you view the in-class video, you will be required to complete the assignment and turn in your responses to me the following week. This will be a graded assignment. Note: Other videos may be shown during class during other class periods as a way of enhancing the lecture. The Week 9 video is the only one which will require a corresponding written assignment.

Sociological Inquiry Assignments (SI): These assignments are designed to help you apply the material presented in the lectures and text to your own experiences and observations of the real world. Further information about the SI assignments will be given during in class.

Study Guide: The textbook for this course includes a Student Study Guide. The Study Guide is to be used to enhance your reading of the textbook and lecture material. It is not designed to replace either the text or lecture. Further instructions on how best to use the study guide will be discussed in class as the instructor sees fit.

Extra Credit or Additional Assignments: Extra credit and other assignments may be given throughout the course.

COURSE POLICIES

Attendance will be taken twice weekly, once at the beginning of class and once at the end of class. Each week you attend the full class period, you will receive 2 check marks () in the grade book. If you are more than thirty minutes late to class, you will miss one check mark (). If you leave before the end of class, you will miss one check mark.
