This course will provide current concepts in the fields of health and safety and their relationship to the young child. Methods of assisting the child to develop good health habits and attitudes will be emphasized.

PEDIATRIC CPR AND FIRST AID: Each student will complete the requirements for certification.

EXAMS:

- 1. Three to four written exams covering text and lecture notes

- 3. You are allowed to make up one exam during the semester within one week

ACTIVITIES:

- 1. In class activities will be provided several times during the semester to promote application of the material learned.
- 2. The activities are done in small groups. The total points are between 0-5, based on the groups level of successful completion.
- 3. Groups will be required to present an oral report in class or submit a written report that day.
- 4. There are no make-ups on missed activities. You are allowed to drop one activity, therefore, if you miss one that is the one that will be dropped.

PROJECT:

- 1. The project is a written assignment. You may select a minimum of 2 articles on a topic of your choice (i.e. child abuse, children's safety issues car seats for example, SIDS, children's nutrition, meal planning).
- 2. The paper is to be typed, double spaced and can be from approximately 3-5 pages. A well-written paper is more important than length.
- 3. The paper is to include the sources at the end.
- 4. The paper is DUE TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1998
- 5. All late papers will receive reduced points
