Required Texts: <u>Patterns For College Writing</u>; <u>The Little, Brown Handbook</u>, <u>The Catcher In The Rye</u>.

Materials: You will need a sturdy folder in which to keep your work. You will also need a dictionary.

Essays: You will be writing six essays for this class. Final drafts of essays will be three to five typed and double-spaced pages. All final essays must be submitted along with rough drafts, which must be numbered and clipped in order underneath the final draft. I will not accept any essay that is submitted to me without the rough drafts. I will give it back and it will not be counted. Take careful note of this fact of life in English 25 class. Staple or paper-clip essays in the upper left-hand corner. That is all. Do not use folders of any kind for individual essays. I particularly dislike those plastic folders with the sliding plastic binders. Ugh.

Essay submission dates: I have given dates for final submissions on the syllabus. These dates are subject to change according to the needs of your individual class. It is your responsibility to stay abreast of what is happening in class and to stay informed about deadlines.

Late essays: I will not under any circumstances accept late essays. However, you may drop any essay during the semester, with the exception of the final essay, which will be a response to <u>The Catcher In The Rye</u>.

Extra Credit: There are no opportunities to earn extra credit in this class.

Attendance: Good attendance is crucial to your success in this class. I will drop you if you miss more than six hours of class time.

Quizzes: You are required to do a good deal of reading. This reading is clearly indicated on your syllabus. Keep up. I will give stupid, boring, idiotic quizzes if you guys fail, as a group, to keep up with your reading. Quizzes will be averaged, if given, to equal one essay grade at the end of the semester.

Writing in addition to formal essays: You will have several smaller, less formal writing assignments throughout the semester. Small writing assignments will be averaged to equal one essay grade at the end of the semester.

Grading: Your essays will be evaluated on the basis of the quality and clarity of their content as well as on the fluency and accuracy of presentation.

Final exam: The final exam for this course is your essay response to the novel <u>The Catcher In The Rve</u>.

Final grade: Your final grade will be calculated by averaging together all essay grades earned during the course of the semester. The final essay will count twice.

Conferences: I may at times suspend class in order to run individual conferences. Your conference will count as that week's class time.
