BRIEF COURSE DESCRIPTION

English 25 offers you, the student, extensive practice in writing to help you develop clear thinking and more fluent use of language. In addition to writing and revising out-of-class essays, you will produce a considerable amount of in-class writing.

In order to receive credit, you must:

1) Submit a passing portfolio at the end of the term

2) Complete at least 70% of the course work

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS

#### Texts:

- --Eschholz, Paul and Alfred Rosa. Themes for Writers. St. Martin's.

#### Miscellaneous Materials:

- --A three-ringed binder in which to keep your journal and other class assignments and writings
- --A three-ringed binder big enough to hold your final portfolio and tabbed dividers
- --Two double-sided, double-density computer disks (do not purchase until after first meeting in computer lab)
- --A good college pocket dictonary. I prefer the <u>American</u>

- --Five 11 x 8 1/2 Examination Blue Books
- --Multiple photocopies of your written essays for peer response workshops
- --Three-hole punched, college-ruled notebook paper for class journal. You may not use pages torn from a spiral

### MAJOR WRITING ASSIGNMENTS

### Out-of-Class Essays:

You will be assigned 5-6 essays that will be mainly written by you outside of class. Each essay must be revised at least two times. Late essays will be docked 10 points for each day that they are late. All drafts of revisions, except prewriting, must be typed using clear, black ink; double-spaced with no more than 1 inch margins; and on clean, white paper.

Please staple pages together on top, left-hand corner.

## In-Class Essays:

There will be at least five 45 minute in-class essays assigned. You may not make up in-class essays missed.

#### Journal:

Nearly every week I will collect a set number of journal pages from you. The assignments will vary sticking pretty close to your text.

These pages must be handwritten by you on lined, collegeruled paper. Loose-leaf binder paper or perforated notebook paper is okay; do not use pages torn from a spiral bound notebook.

### STUDENT/TEACHER CONFERENCES

You and I will meet together 2-3 times in prescheduled, one on one conferences this semester. The purpose of these meetings is for you to discuss with me any questions you have concerning your work. Attendance is mandatory. You are responsible for attending and being prepared with meaningful questions and/or comments about writing.
