**EXERCISES/WRITING ASSIGNMENTS**: Throughout each chapter in Tyner's text, there are exercises and writing assignments. The instructor will assign these to be completed either in class or as homework. **NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED.** 

**QUIZZES**: There will be 20 quizzes given based on what we have learned in Tyner's text. Some quizzes might also be vocabulary tests. Later in the semester, the quizzes will be based on Ernest Hemingway's *The Old Man and the Sea*. The quizzes will take the form of True/False, Multiple choice, or one or more paragraph responses. **YOU CANNOT MAKE-UP QUIZZES**.

**TWO 3 PAGE ESSAYS**: Students are responsible for writing 2 essays. The essays will be at least three (3) full pages in length. They will be double-spaced and must be typed. In addition, you will present one of your essays by reading it to the class. **NO LATE ESSAYS WILL BE ACCEPTED**.

READING JOURNAL: \*Note- Students need to purchase a spiral notebook (full-size) for the Reading Journal. Tyner's text contains 19 readings and your instructor will assign one also for a total of 20. After each reading there is a set of questions For Discussion or Writing. You may concentrate on just one of the questions or you may answer all of them if you so choose, but you must write one full page, in your journal in response to the For Discussion or Writing section at the end of the reading. Each full page written in your journal is worth 10pts for a total of 200pts.

FINAL COMPREHENSIVE EXAM: On the last day of class, you will take a comprehensive final exam. The final comprehensive exam is worth 100pts.
