Course Description:

This course gives students the opportunity to practice writing English sentences, paragraphs, and short papers. Students will cultivate the spelling, vocabulary, punctuation, usage, and sentence structure skills needed by writers. Emphasis will be placed on the communication of the writer's ideas.

Students will be required to submit approximately 10-15 writing assignments and to complete numerous spelling, vocabulary, and sentence structure assignments. There will also be several quizzes, tests, and a final examination. This course is graded as Credit/No Credit only; therefore, a C or better must be earned in order to receive credit for this course.

*Final quiz grades will be based on the average score earned, with the lowest two grades dropped. Missed quizzes cannot be made up, and a score of zero will be earned for each missed quiz.

Class participation is defined as reading class assignments before coming to class; joining in the exchange of opinions in groups; starting appropriate new items for discussion; and perhaps most important of all, asking questions.

In order to receive credit for this course, you must average 70% on all work (earn 280 or more points overall for the semester) and receive a passing score on the essay portion of the final exam. English 50 is graded on a Credit/No Credit basis only.

Paper Policy:

- □ All papers must be typed unless otherwise mentioned. Papers that are not typed will be docked one full grade.
- □ All papers must follow MLA format.
- □ Papers are due at the **beginning** of class on dates assigned.
- You are allowed only one late paper for the semester. If you choose to turn in a paper late, it must be turned in within one week of the due date. Thus, if a paper is due on a Monday and you do not turn it in, you will have until the following Monday to turn in the paper. Being absent from a class does not excuse a student from this policy. **Remember: You are allowed only one late paper for the semester.**
- □ Essays/assignments cannot be left in my box unless discussed with me before the due date.

Essential Information:

- Roll is taken every day. Excessive absences may result in the instructor dropping you from the course. (I consider three absences excessive.) I do not distinguish between excused and unexcused absences.
- □ Aside from the policy regarding late paragraphs and essays, no late work is accepted and no make-ups are allowed.
- ☐ It is your responsibility to stay informed concerning any changes of assignment due dates, readings, etc... Missing a class does not excuse you from this responsibility. (i.e., If due dates

for assignments are given or changed, new assignments are given, etc. . . it is **your** responsibility to find out and adhere to the newest information.)

□ It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw from this and/or any course. Failure to do so may result in an "F" grade being awarded. (As an instructor, I have the option at various times during the semester to drop a student. Should a student not be attending regularly, I will drop said student at that time.)

Helpful Hints:

- Always keep a copy of each writing assignment. This protects you if the instructor should happen to lose one of your papers. (For this course, you should have all writing assignments saved on your diskette. Thus, be mindful of your disk!)
- □ Keep track of your points. You should save all of your work until the end of the semester so you can double check the addition of the instructor.
- Should you discover that you are unable to regularly attend class for whatever reason, it is imperative that you discuss this with the instructor as soon as possible. Telling the instructor of work schedule changes, illness, family emergencies, etc. after missing several days/weeks is unacceptable.
