GRADING

Grades will be based on quizzes (100 points), a mid-term exam (100 points), and a final exam (300 points).

For students to determine where they stand at any given time, they should total the number of points possible for the quizzes and/or tests they have already taken. - 3. Book project The book available for this project is Presumed Innocent by Scott Turow. There will be an open-book quiz with 50 (maximum) points possible given on ______.
