#### Policies and Procedures

Papers: In order to pass this class, you must complete all paper assignments. Failure to complete one paper assignment will result in an F for the course. I require typed papers, double-spaced and on one side of 8.5"x11" sheets of paper. Staple the pages of each paper in the upper left corner before bringing to class. Papers are due at the beginning of class on the due date. Due dates are final. I will not accept late papers, so if you are absent on a due date for any reason, be sure to hand in the paper early or make preparations with a friend to hand your paper in for you.

Responding Sessions: We will have in-class sessions in which you read and respond to essays written by your peers. Your participation is important.

Journal: Frequently I will give in-class and out-of-class assignments to complete in your journal. Please keep a binder of loose 8"x11" sheets of college-ruled paper. This will allow you to order and re-order your assignments easily. For each assignment, write the title and the date on the top of the page. You must keep your journal in order to pass this class.

Attendance and Class Participation: Your participation is vital to your success in this class. Read assigned pieces carefully, complete all homework assignments, and come prepared to contribute at least two points of discussion in class each day. Five or more unexcused absences will result in an F for the course. If you come to class after roll is taken, then you will be counted tardy. Each tardy counts as one half of one absence. Note: Any work missed due to an absence may not be made up (with the exception of in-class assignments missed due to illness or university business. In these situations, an official department or doctor's note is required, and the test must be made up within the next week.).
