Course Objectives:

Learn major concepts, terms and issues covered throughout the texts, lectures, handouts, and assignments.

Assignments:

- (4) Exams worth 50 points each, please have a <u>Scantron 886</u> and a #2 pencil for each exam. Each exam will consist of multiple choice questions, short answer, and an essay question.
- (4) Outside (Current Issue) Reading assignments worth 50 points each. Each reading assignment will be based on topics covered in class and by the text. Each will be due during or immediately after the appropriate section is covered in the text. Students may choose which four sections to write on, but only one assignment per section. These should be no more than 2 to 3 pages, double spaced, typed or printed.
- (1) Final Research Project worth 100 points. This may take the form of a full length research paper, a short paper with visual displays, graphs, interviews, videos, or some other way of demonstrating research done over the semester on one topic of interest. This may be an individual, pair, or three person project.
