COURSE DESCRIPTION:

* HELLO and WELCOME to ASL 2!!! This course is designed to continue to introduce students to a visual-gestural, multi-dimensional language (ASL) which is used by the Deaf community in the United States and Canada. It will introduce students to the culture of the Deaf community and its appropriate behaviors. Students will also be engaging in conversation using ASL at a level expected for ASL 2 learners. Students are expected to actively participate in a variety of class activities in each class session throughout the entire semester. Students are also expected to attend and actively participate in Deaf Community Events.

ATTENDANCE:

* Attendance is strongly encouraged and required in order to provide a conducive learning environment for the entire class; as well as individually. If you miss a class, are late, and/or leave early, your participation grade will be affected as a deduction of points will occur. It is your responsibility to notify the instructor when you have missed a quiz or exam. If you miss an exam, there will not be any make-ups offered. Unless there is an extenuating circumstance; to be determined by the instructor, you will not be allowed to make-up the mid-term or final.

PUNCTUALITY:

* Students are expected to arrive to class on time and attend for the entire class period. I cannot teach you if you are not in class. We will take breaks accordingly. Your participation grade will be affected if you are late for class or if you leave early from class.

HOMEWORK & CLASSROOM PARTICIPATION:

* When assignments are given, I strongly encourage you to complete them to the best of your ability. I also expect them to be turned in at the assigned due date. Your classroom participation plays a significant role in the assessment of your final grade; as well as, how well you learn the language. Experience has shown, that students who participate and are motivated, learn more and sign better.

QUIZZES:

* You will have two quizzes. Each quiz covers two units. It is imperative that you do not miss these quizzes because you will not be able to make-up any quiz for any reason. NO MAKE-UPS.

QUIZ ONE: Quiz one will cover Units 7 and 8 July 12, 2002 QUIZ TWO: Quiz Two will cover Units 10 and 11 July 29, 2002

EXAMINATIONS:

* There will be a total of 2 exams. These exams are the Mid-Term and the Final. The Mid-Term and Final exams will be **cumulative**. I may give a POP quiz for extra points so this means that each student must be well prepared for each and every class. **NO MAKE-UPS**.

PRESENTATIONS:

* There will be 3 presentations. All presentations are signed in ASL. The presentations are described below:

Presentation One: (10 points) Your Cultural Heritage: The worksheet describing this presentation is included in this syllabus. Due Wednesday July 3rd, 2002.

Presentation Two: (100 points) Topic or Person: This presentation is a topic or person that exemplifies Deaf Culture or Deaf History. You must have chosen your topic and or person by July 9th, 2002. You may choose the topic or person; however, you need to get my approval by getting my initials signed on the following line. ______ (7/09/02)

You are responsible for the research. You must use a variety of resources. Written materials, Internet, Personal accounts etc. Are all acceptable resources. This presentation will be 5-7 minutes in length. You will receive a checklist for this presentation shortly after this week.

Due August 6, 2002.

Presentation Three: (50 points) *Story:* There will also be a Story in which you will sign a story of your choice in ASL. This is tentatively scheduled. However, I feel strongly that students are afforded the opportunity to present to the class so that their skills can be fostered in the expressive manner. **Due August 7th, 2002.**

DEAF COMMUNITY EVENT/ SOCIAL: (90 points) You are required to attend a community event within the Deaf Community OR meet with a Deaf person or group of Deaf people and socialize with them. A minimum of one hour fulfills this requirement. Write a reflection paper (1-2 pages) about your experience and be prepared to share your experience to a small group by signing in ASL. You must have completed both your community or social experience and paper by the DUE date so that you can share to your small group. **DUE August 8th, 2002.**

EXPECTATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS OF THE STUDENTS:

- * Please wait until I assign readings and viewings of the videotape; otherwise, you may experience frustration. The timing of the material is crucial to the success of learning each task.
- * In order to facilitate the learning and mastery of ASL at this level, students are not allowed to speak during class. Pretend you are in the Deaf world when you enter the classroom. This means to TURN OFF YOUR VOICES PLEASE.
- * Students are not allowed to act as "pseudo" interpreters. This means that if you know more signs than another student, you are not to interpret. This is to ensure that each student has the opportunity to learn at his/her own pace. We all learn differently and I embrace this quality as individual learners.
- ***Remember, ASL and English are two distinct languages possessing their own linguistic features in terms of phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, pragmatics, and discourse. Thus, the sign vocabulary will be taught in context since many signs in ASL do not have English equivalents.
