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On Critical Reading/Writing...

This class is about thinking. Not the everyday routine thinking that travels our minds at a dull pace, but rather, the active vital critical thinking that leads to complexity, growth, and understanding. As a class and as individuals, we will embark on an intellectual project that will pose 'big' questions. Though sometimes answered simply by most, we will instead look behind the surface issues and attempt to understand subjects more deeply. We will work with ideas, bodies of knowledge — understanding them, expanding them, connecting them, and shaping them. We will explore what we know and how we know it. We will engage, debate, and utilize them to some greater end.

Critical thinking (writing and reading) skills will be pushed above the expectations of English 1A. These requirements will include high-level argument strategies, new reading strategies, and a greater emphasis on content in essays.

Domain:

The class will work with one major subject during the term. This will be announced near the beginning of the course.

The Plan: (typical class period)

- 1. Class business, general discussion.
- 2. Vocabulary review (beginning of week list, end of week review and turn in)
- 3. In class lecture/reading/discussion/writing. Assignments will be from a prompt I (or you) have created and/or have connected to something from the text.
- 4. Out of class reading/writing. Usually tied to the in class assignment.

The things we'll carry: *notebook *writing instrument Book: Current Issues and Enduring Questions

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On Writing...

This class aims at moving students closer to the model of an 'expert' writer where one is able to make informed decisions about any writing task and employ a wide range of tools and strategies to write the best possible paper - not just any paper. It is designed to get students to think beyond their own personal experience and use sources (not just as storehouses of information but as works to engage, debate, and utilize to some greater end).

Aside from the mechanics of writing essays, we will be spending a fair amount of time working with ideas and improving content. Several essays will be brought in for discussion to yield material for our writing. These short works will be on a variety of subjects (everything from history to science, fiction to non-fiction, philosophy to politics) and we will look to cultivate observations, arguments, and ideas that will fulfill the expectations of effective college writing.

The Plan: Each class meeting will have several areas to cover.

- 1. Class business, general discussion.
- 2. Vocabulary review of previous week's lists, sentences and grammar (vocabulary will not be every week).
- 3. In class lecture/reading/discussion/writing. Assignments will be from a prompt I have created and/or have connected to something from the text.
- 4. Out of class reading/writing. Usually tied to the in class assignment.
