BEGINNING ALGEBRA

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Operations with signed numbers, algebraic expressions, linear equations and their graphs, inequalities, systems of equations, exponents and polynomials, factoring, and rational expressions

PREREQUISITE: Successful completion (grade of *C* or better) of Math 250 or eligibility as determined by the assessment process

OBJECTIVES:

Students will be able to:

- learn the real number system, its subsets and how to perform operations on numbers from these subsets.
- simplify algebraic expressions and solve linear equations and inequalities
- graph linear equations in two variables and solve systems of linear equations.
- simplify expressions using the properties of exponents and perform operations with polynomials.
- factor algebraic expressions and solve equations of degree greater than one.
- perform arithmetic operations on rational expressions and solve equations containing rational expressions.

TEXT: George Woodbury, <u>Beginning & Intermediate Algebra</u>, 2nd Edition

HOMEWORK:

Homework assignments are completed online and the assignments can be found at the *Course Compass* website. You may work ahead if you like; all homework for the entire chapter will be made available to the student approximately two weeks before the start of the chapter. *It is important to stay current to be successful in the course!* Each assignment has a due date and the assignment will be unavailable to the student after the due date. **No late homework will be accepted**. Online homework will account for **20%** of your grade.

Note: When working on homework, you do not have to complete an entire assignment during one session. If you need to stop while in the middle of an assignment, simply hit the **Submit** icon and the program will save your work. You can then come back to the assignment and continue from where you left off at another time.

QUIZZES:

There will be one to two in-class quizzes for each chapter. These quizzes will be worth 20 points each and will be given at the **beginning of class and will have a time constraint**. **Students who are tardy to class on the day of a quiz will not be allowed to take the quiz and receive a grade of zero for that quiz.** Quizzes will account for **20%** of your grade.

TESTS:

- Seven (7) chapter tests, worth 100 points each, will be given.
- An average score of 70% on the unit's homework is a *prerequisite* for the exam. If you have earned *at least 70%* of the possible homework points for that unit, then whatever score you earn on your exam will be the score entered for your exam grade. If, however, you earn *less than 70%* on your homework, then the *average of your homework grade and your test score* will be the score entered for your exam grade.
- There are **NO MAKEUPS** for missed tests. **NO EXCEPTIONS**!!
- If you absolutely <u>must</u> be absent on the day a test is scheduled, you may discuss with me the possibility of taking the test <u>early</u>.

FINAL EXAM:

A two hour comprehensive final exam worth 200 points will be given at the end of the semester during final exams week. This final exam is *mandatory and will count as a regular exam.* The final **may** be used to replace a low test score or a missed test. The final **may not** be used to replace the homework grade or quiz grade.

GRADING:

- HOMEWORK (20%): All of your homework scores will be added up and multiplied by .20 (900 total points will be possible)
- **QUIZZES (20%):** Your quiz grades will be added up and multiplied by **.20** (140 total points will be possible)
- **TESTS (60%):** All of your test percentages and the final will be added up and multiplied by **.60** (900 total points will be possible)

Example: If your homework total is 800, your quiz total is 120 and your exam and final total is 780, then you would compute your grade as follows:

$$\frac{\left[(.20)(800) + (.20)(120) + (.60)(780)\right]}{748} = \frac{160 + 24 + 468}{748}$$
$$= \frac{652}{748}$$
$$= 0.8716 \Rightarrow 87\%$$

• Your grade will then be determined by the following grading scale:
