<u>Course Description</u>: ESL 265LS is a listening and speaking course designed for speakers of other languages who want to develop oral language skills at the low-intermediate level. This course may be taken concurrently with ESL 265. ESL 265LS is four levels below English 1A. Students who successfully complete this course will be prepared for ESL 266LS.

<u>Subject Prerequisites</u>: English as a Second Language 264LS or placement through a multiple-measure process, including an appropriate score on an approved English as a Second Language placement test.

Texts and Materials:

- 1. Top Notch 3 by Joan Saslow and Allen Ascher, 2006.
- 2. English dictionary (**Recommended** Longman Dictionary of American English)
- 3. Notebook, pencil, and high lighter.

<u>Class Attendance and Participation</u>: Attendance is mandatory. You must inform me about absences in <u>advance</u> and make proper arrangements to complete coursework. Absence and tardiness will severely affect your grade. Leaving class earlier will also affect your grade. If you have more than 3 absences, you may be dropped from class.

Homework: Some homework assignments will be posted on *Blackboard*, and they will be collected at the beginning of class. Only under special circumstances late homework will be accepted, but you may lose 5-10 points for each late assignment. No late homework assignments are accepted if not turned in by the next day of class.

Blackboard: This is a useful tool for you to stay up to date on coursework. You will find some homework assignments, announcements, and your grade so it is your responsibility to check *Blackboard* regularly. To access *Blackboard*, you need to use your student ID number as your login and password.
