**Course Description**: This class is structured to guide intermediate pianists to further

development of their technical facility and performance skills.

**Attendance**: Regular attendance and punctuality are strongly recommended and

will greatly affect your grade. **More than eight combined hours of absence will result in a failing grade.** If a student is tardy, it is the student's responsibility to make sure he or she is marked present (after class). **Any student with marked absences in the first three weeks may be dropped. Students may be dropped at the withdraw date (10/15) at the discretion of the instructor if they have missed a significant number** 

of class or practice hours.

**Grading**: Your grade will be determined from a combination of homework,

quizzes/midterm, playing tests, a final examination, and a final recital. Completion of all portions of the class is mandatory. The rubric is as

follows:

Homework: 20% Midterm Exam: 10% Playing Tests: 30% Final Exam: 20%

Recital: 20% (THURSDAY 12/15, 6:00pm, FORUM 1)

A = 90% and above, B = 80-89.99%, C = 70-79.99%, D = 60-69.99%, F = 59.99% and below

## **Objectives and Outcomes:**

Students will continue to develop basic knowledge of the piano keyboard, including correct posture and hand positioning, note names for all of the black and white keys, half steps and whole steps, major and minor five-finger patterns, chord progressions, two-octave scales, and Hanon exercises.

Students will learn to interpret how basic music notation on the grand staff is applicable to their instrument. This will include written notes, time signatures, key signatures, accidentals, dynamics, and rhythm. Rhythms included will be sixteenth, eighth, quarter, half, and whole notes and dotted notes and rests. All meter and key signatures are possible material in this class.

Students will demonstrate a practical understanding of music notation by reading and playing notes on the piano, counting out loud, and dictating simple notes and rhythms.

Students will understand and apply the process of transposition of songs to different keys.

Students will come to know the process behind preparing a piece of music for public performance by preparing and memorizing a piece and performing it in recital. The difficulty of performance material will be markedly more than in Music 20 or 21.

Classroom work will include lecture/demonstration, performance-based quizzes, and group drill at the keyboards. Homework will include assignments from the theory workbooks and class text.

Homework will not be accepted after the week it is due.

All skills tests must be attempted.

The recital is mandatory. Students who miss the recital may receive an Incomplete or failing grade.

The Midterm will be administered during class.

The Final exam will be a cumulative take-home exam due at the recital.

The Midterm and Final Exams will be open note exams. If you would like your final exam back at the end of the semester, provide a self addressed stamped envelope with your completed exam.
