<u>Course Description</u>: This course is designed to re-introduce students to a visual-gestural language used by the Deaf community in the United States and Canada. It will assist them to learn more about the culture of the Deaf community and its appropriate behaviors. They will also be engaging in conversation using American Sign Language (ASL) at a level expected for high-beginning signers.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: Using ASL, students will learn to:

- * Identify and produce signs covered in class
- * Produce non-manual grammatical signals
- * Introduce themselves to others
- * Describe features of people, clothing, and objects
- * Describe your occupation
- * Engage in brief question and answer dialogue

Class Participation & Expectations

- * In order to facilitate the learning of ASL, students are encouraged NOT to speak in the classroom. Therefore, leave your voice outside the classroom. ASL is a visual language, not an auditory language. This will be part of your class participation points.
- * Students are encouraged to raise their hand and ask the instructor when they do not understand what the instructor is teaching. It is every student's responsibility to ask for clarification and the instructor will be happy to clarify. ©
- * Students are not expected to understand every sign the first time they see it, but they are encouraged to keep trying by observing and participating as much as possible.
- * Making mistakes is an expected part of the learning process. Therefore, please do not feel afraid of making errors.
- *Remember, ASL and English are two separate languages. The sign vocabulary will be taught in context since there are many signs in ASL that do not have English equivalents.
- * It is strongly encouraged for you to have daily study groups or have a classmate to practice your signing skills.
- * The most important thing you can do is relax. Watch and practice, practice, and practice! $\ensuremath{\circledcirc}$

Grades and Requirements:

- * Attendance and Class Participation: Students are required to attend all classes since active participation is VITAL to the learning process and acquisition of the basic principles of ASL. Five points will be deducted if you miss class. Two points will be deducted if you leave class early or arrive late or talk in class.
- * **Quizzes:** Five quizzes will be given in class. Your lowest quiz will be dropped and there will be <u>NO make-up quizzes</u>.
- * Class Assignments: Four class assignments will be given throughout this Fall session. I will inform you of the due dates as the session progresses. Three points will be taken off if class assignments are submitted late.
- * Midterm & Final Exams: The midterm and final exams will be cumulative. I will inform you of the exact date for the Midterm as the Fall session progresses. There are two parts to the final exam. The first part will be signed. The second part of the final exam will include multiple choice and true/false answers. There will be NO midterm and final exam make-ups. The Signed Final will take place on 12/4 and 12/5 and the Written Final on 12/6.
