Assignments

1. Reading Reaction Cards (10 entries x 5pts) (50points) Throughout the course of the semester you will write a reflection on the material assigned for that week. Each entry should include your PERSONAL REACTION from a chapter, information presented and discussed during lecture, or videos viewed during class. A reflection is not retelling the lecture, but how the information you learned on that day affected you. What did you learn? How will you apply the information in your current job or your future job. Reading reactions will be collected each week (Wk 3-17) unless other-wise discussed in class.

- 2. Personal Ecological System. Bronfenbrenner's ecological systems model is a key concept in this course. You will be creating a diagram which includes the main players in your life within each of the systems described by Bronfenbrenner.
- 3. Community Resource (50 points) You will need to research and document a community resource that supports children and families. A one page written informational page will be expected. More information will be provided.
- 4. Quiz at 11 (15@5pts) 75points At the start of every class session we will have a 5point guiz reviewing some key points from the previous week. The quiz will begin at 11 am. If you are not in class as the start of the quiz you will not be allowed to take it and will automatically receive a 0 on the quiz.
- 5. Socialization Project (115 points) This will be the culminating experience of the class. Additional information will be provided.
- 6. Exams There will be two exams each worth 50 points and a comprehensive final exam worth 100pts.
- 7. In-Class Assignments We will have many opportunities for in class participation during the semester. I will randomly award points for your participation in these assignments. If you are not in class you can't participate which means you miss the points for that assignment.
