# **TEXTBOOK:**

There are pages to read and map locations to find and memorize. **You** have to provide your own time and effort to do the work, and the only one telling you to do that, once you have left campus, is **YOU!** 

**DO NOT** stay in this class if you cannot or will not get a copy of the text, or if you can't make yourself do the necessary work.

**MAPS:** You will need to obtain blank maps (available at the college bookstore) in order to do the map work necessary for this course. Colored pens and pencils may also help. In many cases, it is best to consult an *atlas* in order to do this work accurately. An *optional* atlas is listed below.

### **COURSE OUTCOMES:**

- (2) use a map to illustrate the geographic features of the regions studied
- (3) discuss the geographic basis of the major international and domestic issues in the regions studied
- (4) discuss current world issues using an international perspective rather than a local one
