2. COURSE DESCRIPTION

ART 7

In this course, students will learn traditional drawing skills and techniques through practice using a variety of subjects from still life, models, and the natural world as representational, abstract, and non-objective art, and through the study of master drawings. Coursework will include the introduction of drawing material, the study and practice of art design elements and principles of art as related to drawing, such as line, shape, value, proportion, space, contrast, balance, implied texture, and scale; and apply these in creating a composition. The goal of the class is to learn fundamental technical drawing skills, then expand upon them to begin the development of a more creative gestural drawing application. The course will assist students to organize, problem-solve, and think creatively. Students will be guided by class discussions, short lectures, testing of art vocabulary, and project critiques. Project requirements will be provided in class during the first week.

ART 17

In this course, students will continue and expand on their learned skills from Art 7 and begin the use of color, and apply contemporary drawing techniques and materials. Coursework will include drawings applying the basics of color theory and its application in a composition. Students will be required to keep a journal and create a portfolio as part of the coursework's requirement of a major project. Details of the required progression of the project along with individual drawing assignments will be provided in class during the first week. The course will encourage students to experiment with

a variety of drawing materials and develop ways of working as a means of finding their own style and form of expression.

3. COURSE OBJECTIVES

a. To develop an understanding of the basic of drawing, drawing materials, techniques, and relevant vocabulary;

b. To learn how to 'see' and apply visual skills when drawing;

c. To learn basic drawing and compositional skills;

d. To learn how to apply course material to improve idea-development and problem-solving related to two-dimensional art and the creation of artwork.

e. To learn to explore and experiment with techniques and materials.

Studio Projects, Homework, and Sketchbook (Art 7); Journal (Art 17)	Students are expected to spend a minimum of 9 hours per week on project inside and outside of class. Projects will be checked and graded during the class session. If a project is not finished during the class session, it will be considered homework. All projects are due on the specified dates. A late project is marked down one full grade.
	<u>Art 7:</u> The sketchbook assignment will be provided after the THIRD WEEK of class. Sketchbooks will be used to take notes of lecture material, idea development, and responses to critiques. A sketchbook of 25 pages at minimum must be meaningfully completed.
	<u>Art 17</u> : In addition to your project, studies for the project, notes, inspirational ideas, clippings from text, quotations, responses to critiques, idea development will be kept in a journal, which will be graded at each class session after the THIRD WEEK of class . A journal of 50 pages at minimum must be meaningfully completed.

Critiques	 f. The student's attendance record. In the middle and at the end of the semester, we will have critiques. Critiques are focused opportunities to share intentions, thoughts, and to assist students in their development. The purpose of the critique process is to help each student understand the strengths and weaknesses in his/her work. Attendance and participation are mandatory. If not present, points will be lost.
