ART 9 & ART 19: BEGINNING & INTERMEDIATE PAINTING

Art 9 Course Description: This course is an exploration of the creative act of painting using representational, abstract and non-objective forms. Emphasis is placed on the fundamentals of composition and the ability to handle materials. Students will learn basic color theory, value, line, shape, texture and techniques including direct paint application, glazing, brush strokes and impasto. Issues concerning canvas stretching, brush cleaning, mixing glazes and toxicity are addressed. Through lecture and studio practice, students gain introductory skills in painting within the context of an historical perspective.

Art 19 Course Description: This course is an exploration of the creative act of painting using representational, abstract, and non-objective forms. Students will build upon skills learned in beginning painting and create a cohesive body of work. Historical and contemporary approaches to oil and acrylic media are integrated into course content.

Warning: This is a college course where the introduction and exploration of controversial ideas, topics, language, ideologies, and artistic themes may be presented. As a college student, it is your job to openly consider these ideas and think critically about them. Some people may find these concepts offensive to their belief system and/or worldview and should understand that they may be presented in lectures, demonstrations, and given as assignments.

Academic Accommodation: If you have a verified need for an academic accommodation or materials in alternate media (i.e. Braille, large print, electronic text, etc.) per the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, please contact me as soon as possible. In addition, it is your responsibility to contact the Disabled Student Services Office at extension 3332 to request Academic Accommodation.

Attendance Policy: Class attendance is mandatory. Students are expected to arrive on time and leave only when the class is dismissed. Any unexcused absences in excess of four (the equivalent of two weeks of class) for the entire semester will result in a lowered final grade. Two late arrivals to class will equal one unexcused absence. Two early departures from class will equal one unexcused absence. Class begins on time and the doors are locked. If you are late, then you will be locked out and you will be marked as absent that day. You will not be allowed to make up any lessons or assignments. High school students taking this class are not excused from attendance even if their high school is not in session. It is the student's responsibility to get assignments and class materials after an absence. Absences are only excused and valid if supporting documentation is presented. It is Board Policy that students who miss two or more weeks of class meetings before the 9th week of class can be dropped.

Breaks occur from 1:50 pm to 2:00 pm and once again from 2:50 am to 3:00 pm. You may NOT leave class twenty minutes early if you decline to take breaks at the designated times. In addition, consistently taking more break time than allotted will reduce your final grade.

Friday, March 11, 2016 is the last day to drop a class without a letter grade.

Personal Electronics Policy: Smart phones, cell phones, iPods, MP3 players, headphones, and other similar electronic devices will be turned off and stored out of sight during class.

Conduct Policy: Students are expected to behave like adults and demonstrate respect for the instructor, other students, the classroom environment, and themselves. Students who are unable or unwilling to conduct themselves appropriately will be required to leave the class until such time they can function maturely. Any lessons or projects due during such a suspension will NOT be accepted and the student will forfeit those points.

Grading Policy: You will be graded on how successfully you work in class, complete assignments and homework, and contribute to the group discussions/critiques/projects. Regular attendance, completion of all assignments and homework, and other course requirements does **not** guarantee a passing grade. Late assignments will not be accepted. Incomplete assignments will reduce your grade.
