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### **Course Description:**

This course provides students an opportunity to learn medical vocabulary with concentration on prefixes, suffixes, and root words. Emphasis is given to word dissection and definitions as applied to the body systems including the terminology used in examinations, diagnoses, procedures, laboratory investigations, and medical reports. Students must pass a final 160-word definition exam with 95% accuracy in order to pass the course.

**Advisories:** Eligibility for English 125 and 126 (This means that if you did not test at this level or above, you should not be able to pass this class. Email me with questions/concerns.)

#### **Course Outcomes:**

Upon successful completion of this course, student will be able to:

- 1. differentiate between the uses and meaning of medical terms formed from related root vocabulary.
- 2. analyze word parts and demonstrate ability to write medical terms correctly.
- 3. use their knowledge of prefixes, suffixes, and roots to ascertain meanings of words with which they are not familiar.
- 4. apply knowledge of anatomy and word parts to analyze medical terminology and its applications so as to prevent errors in medical records and in directions and applications of the terminology.
- 5. complete a final 160-word definition exam with 95% accuracy.

### **Course Objectives:**

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. identify the full and complete definition of 160 prefixes, suffixes and word roots.
- 2. construct medical words from prefixes, suffixes and word roots.
- 3. spell medical words correctly.
- 4. demonstrate an understanding of the meaning of medical words by using prefixes, suffixes and word roots.
- 5. label anatomy of the various body systems covered.



Assignment Due Dates/Times: This is an online course therefore there is some flexibility as to when assignments can be completed. This does not mean that assignments can be late. I do not accept late assignments. Assignments and quizzes will be "opened" in Black Board at the beginning of each week. They are due the following Sunday by midnight. No exceptions. This means that an assignment or quiz will be available on Monday and you may complete them anytime between Monday and midnight Sunday. This allows you to decide which days are best for you. I completed my Master's degree online and found that a Sunday midnight deadline was best for all of my classes since I worked full time and did not feel I had time to work on my class during the week. I could work on my classwork all weekend, turning it in by midnight on Sunday and start fresh on Monday.

## Speaking of which: (time management)

It is important for you to realize that an online class does not take less time than a face-to-face class. In order to be successful in a 3 unit face-to-face class, it is expected that the student will be engaged in the class 3 hours per week and working on the class for 6-9 hours per week.
