Course Description

Biology 20 is a 4-unit biology course with 3 lecture hours and 3 lab hours per week. This is a course providing a basic understanding and working knowledge of the human body with emphasis on the structure of each major system. The interrelationship between human systems and the relationships between the structure and functions of each system will be studied at several levels: cellular, tissue, organ, system, and organismal.

- I. Course Objectives: In the process of completing this course, students will
 - Identify the basic structure and function of each human system at the macroscopic and microscopic levels.
 - Develop important critical thinking skills as they evaluate lecture topics and the results of laboratory demonstrations and experiments.
 - Learn how to use scientific methods.
 - Develop important manual dexterity skills associated with dissections, free-hand drawings, completion of anatomical color plates, and the operation of microscopes, computers, and other laboratory equipment.

Grades will be posted on Canvas and will be updated regularly throughout the semester.

VII. Exams and Major Assignments

- Lecture Exams. Exams may only be made up due to extreme circumstances, at the discretion of the instructor, if arranged with the instructor before the scheduled exam period (at least 3 hrs prior). There will be 4 midterms and a comprehensive final exam (see the Tentative Schedule for exam dates). Each exam will include new material covered in the corresponding unit. Exams will consist of multiple-choice, matching, fill in the blank, and short-answer/essay questions. Forming study groups is highly recommended. All exams will be given in class. Final Exam is cumulative.
- Lab Exams. Lab exams must be taken on the day that they are scheduled. There are no make-ups, no exceptions. There will be 4 lab exams (see the Tentative Schedule for exam dates). These exams will be in the form of a practical, where stations are set up with models, microscopes, and/or images for identification. Students will be timed (45 seconds per question) and will rotate around the room until all students have been through all stations. All questions are fill-in.
- Lab Reports. Each lab session will have an associated lab report. Lab reports are due at the beginning of the next lab session (during the first 10 minutes of lab), unless otherwise informed by the instructor. No late lab reports will be accepted. *You cannot turn in a lab report for a lab that you were not in attendance of.* Lab reports must be submitted on the lab report pages from the lab manual. No photocopied or regular paper copies will be accepted.
- Lab Drawings. For each lab session, students will be required to submit one lab drawing. Suggestions of drawings will be given for each lab session, but students have the flexibility to choose what drawing they will do. These drawings are to be annotated (further information on annotating will be given in class and posted on Canvas). Lab drawings are due at the time of the lab exam for each unit. No late lab drawings will be accepted.
- In-class Quizzes. Quizzes will be given at the <u>beginning</u> of the scheduled lecture sessions (See Tentative Schedule for Dates). Quizzes will consist of multiple choice questions and will contain information covered in the unit up to that point. Quizzes cannot be made up if missed.
- Mastering A&P Quizzes. Assignments will be set-up through Canvas using the Mastering A&P materials associated with your textbook (Note: you can only access these assignments if you purchase the bundle that includes the Mastering A&P access). Every lecture will have an associated Mastering A&P assignment. These assignments (and the eBook) can be accessed through Canvas. Mastering A&P assignments will be due at the end of each unit (at the time of the lecture exam). See Canvas for exact due dates.
- Extra credit. Extra credit can be earned by completing all Mastering A&P assignments, all lab reports, and all lab drawings. Each category has extra points allotted (see Grading for full breakdown). Throughout the semester, there will be a total of 30 extra credit points offered (or 2.5%). There will be no other extra credit offered in this course.

VIII. Participation Standards

• Study Expectations. Consider using the following statement:
It is usually expected that students will spend approximately 2 hours of study time outside of class for every one hour in class. Since this is a 4-unit class (6 hrs/week), you should expect to study an average of *at least* 12 hours outside of class each week. Some students may need more outside study time and some less.
