## **Course Description:**

This course provides an overview of topics related to child maltreatment. Child maltreatment includes neglect and physical, sexual, and psychological abuse. Major course topics include: defining child maltreatment; cross-cultural issues in the definition of child maltreatment; the incidence and prevalence of different types of child maltreatment; the causes and consequences of child maltreatment; forensic and clinical assessment of child maltreatment; the repressed memory controversy; mandated reporting and other legal issues; and psychosocial interventions for maltreated children and their families.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

By successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

- Describe how to profile child abusers.
- Define child abuse and neglect.
- Recognize the basic signs of child abuse.
- Assess signs of abuse.
- Describe Munchausen's by Proxy.
- Describe reporting procedures and responsibilities for child abuse.
- Know Child Abuse Law Enforcement Procedures.
- Describe the investigative process for child abuse.
- Describe how to interview children regarding abuse.
- Describe ways and responses when confronting a suspect.
- Describe methods of interviewing parents.
- Describe ways to protect children from child abuse

- Demonstrate an understanding of how typical development is a difficult task for the abused and neglected child
- Explain and supply solutions to the problems encountered in child abuse
- Learn how communication is vital skill for maltreating parents to develop
- Learn how parents must be able to recognize their own feelings, communicate them articulately and appreciate the feelings of others.
- Learn to take responsibility for being a mandated reporter for child abuse
- Be able to analyze different career operations in the areas of criminal justice, psychology, teaching, social work and others and State and Federal child abuse treatment programs.
