Course Description:

In this course we will be learning about the visual arts and their historical and cultural significance. We will be covering various types of media and movements from around the world and learn how to discuss these art forms through visual language. We will examine the relationships between artistic practices and belief systems, institutional frameworks and individual creativity; the role of the artist, patron, and viewer in relation to the work of art will also be topics for discussion.

Course Objectives:

In the process of completing this course the students will:

- 1. Utilize basic knowledge of the visual arts, including architecture, crafts, drawing, film, digital/electronic media, painting, photography, printmaking, and sculpture.
- 2. Use knowledge of the elements and principles of design to further understanding of art Objects.
- 3. Distinguish use of the various materials and techniques used by artists.
- 4. Interpret based on an understanding of visual imagery, including the use of signs, symbols, and metaphor.
- 5. Understand how context influences art and its evolution from past to the present.
- 6. Understand how art functions in society.
- 7. Interpret basic types of artists and artisans, including but not limited to Shaman, Classical, Folk, Guild, Individual, Modern, and Contemporary.
- 8. Articulate a visual and conceptual understanding of the major periods in art history.
- 9. Use an informed vocabulary to articulate an enhanced appreciation for art.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of the visual vocabulary of art.
- 2. Analyze the different types of media within a cultural and/or historical context.
- 3. Critique works of art within a cultural and/or historical context.

Prerequisites: There are no prerequisites for this course.

Grades

There will be three exams, one written artist report, and a final examination. Each exam will be worth 150 points. The final will be worth 150 points. A written artist report will be worth 150 points. There will be weekly assignments including but not limited to pop quizzes, in class assignments, homework worth 10 points the first week, and then 15 points per week for the following 16 weeks of the course. Regular Attendance, completion of all assignments, and other course requirements does not guarantee a passing grade. No late assignments will be accepted.

Grades will be calculated as follows: 900-1000= Excellent (A), 800-899= Above Average (B), 700-799= Average (C), 600-699 = Below Average (D), 500-599= Failure (F)

It is the student's responsibility to track their grades. Grades will be posted on Canvas.

Extra credit: One extra credit opportunity worth a total of 20 points will be available during this course.

Testing: Do not leave the room during an exam without Instructor permission.

Electronic devices of any kind, open books or notes will not be allowed during examinations without prior instructor permission.

Films may be shown in this class. Content of these films may appear on examinations Any change to testing dates will be announced in regular class sessions.

Attendance:

Attendance and full participation during each class is expected. It is the student's responsibility to get assignments and class materials after an absence. Excusable Absences such as jury duty or doctor's visit are only excused and valid if supporting documentation is presented. If you miss a class or know you are going to miss a class, you do not need to inform me. If it is an excused absence bring supporting documentation on the next day of instruction.

Exams are made up of questions from both reading and lecture; therefore, exemplary attendance will be necessary for a high grade in this class. Roll will be taken at the beginning of each class session. It is the responsibilities of tardy students to have their name entered on roll sheets. Late students will receive notification on roll sheets.

Students are expected to attend all sessions of classes for which they are enrolled. Excessive absence will jeopardize a student's satisfactory progress in a class. Students may be dropped from class if they fail to attend the first class session of the semester. The faculty places strong emphasis on attendance in all classes. Students are expected to be in the classroom at the time the class begins. Instructors are required to take attendance at each class session and to report any student who is absent for two successive weeks of instruction. Unless there are significant extenuating circumstances, that student will be immediately dropped from class by the instructor if the absences are occurring before 50 percent of the class is expired. Lack of regular attendance after the 50 percent drop deadline may result in an unsatisfactory grade. Once dropped, should a student believe there is just cause for reinstatement, the student may petition through the office of Admissions and Records. It is the students' responsibility to drop any classes they no longer wish to continue. They must not merely stop attending and must not rely on being dropped by others. Students must complete the drop process for themselves.

High school enrichment and dual enrolled students: Students enrolled through high school enrichment and dual enrollment programs are required to follow college schedules. No special consideration regarding due dates, quiz or test makeups, will be given to any student who chooses to remain on their home campus instead of attending class.

Student adds: Students will be added to this class provided there are open seats available for the first two weeks the semester. No students will be added beyond the second week of the semester.

Note taking: Students will need to utilize quality note taking abilities to achieve a high grade in this class.

Disruptive classroom behavior will not be tolerated. It is essential to the learning environment that students respect the opinions and ideas of other students during discussion and do not disrupt class lecture.

Conduct Policy:

Students are expected to conduct themselves according to Reedley College's Student Code of Conduct Policy. To demonstrate respect for the instructor, other students, the classroom environment, and themselves. Students who are unable or unwilling to conduct themselves appropriately will be required to leave the class. Any quizzes or exams given during such a suspension will NOT be made up and the student will forfeit those points.

Authority and Disciplinary Actions: Failure to adhere to the college's standards will result in disciplinary action. The college reserves the right to exclude at any time a student who violates student conduct standards and/or is not taking proper advantage of the opportunities offered.

Removal from Class by Instructor: An instructor may remove a disruptive student from his or her class for the day of the removal and the next class meeting. If this occurs the instructor shall immediately report the removal to the Vice President of Student Services. During the period of removal, a student shall not be returned to the class from which he or she was removed without the concurrence of the instructor of the class.

Technology: Laptops, computers, tablets with the sound turned off *are* acceptable for taking notes. Disrupting the class for example, by surfing the web for non-class related reasons will not be tolerated. Students engaging in such activities will be required to power off their device or leave the classroom.

Silence and put away all personal electronics such as phones, headphones, any other hand held audio-visual and/ or gaming devices etc. To pass this course you will need to pay attention in class so please use your technology responsibly. The instructor reserves the right to limit or prohibit the use of electronics within the class at any time.

Canvas: Canvas will be used in this class. All students will need active e-mail and Canvas accounts for this class. However, students should in no way consider Canvas a substitute for class attendance. The written Artist Report will be submitted through Canvas via turnitin.com. No hard copies of papers will be accepted.

Mindtap: Mindtap is the online learning platform which accompanies our classroom textbook. Resources on Mindtap may be utilized by students in this course. All students will need an active Mindtap account for this class. See the activation instructions found with your copy of the text.

Email: I will check e-mail periodically. Students do not need to e-mail concerning missed classes etc.
