COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course develops fundamental piano skills including theory, terminology, technique, and beginning level repertoire. It is designed for the general student as well as the classroom teacher. (*Recommended for all Music Majors*.)

COURSE CONTENT:

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate ability to play triads and 5-note scales in all 12 major keys.
- 2. Demonstrate a knowledge of topics in basic music theory as it applies to the piano
- 3. Demonstrate ability to perform simple piano pieces while reading music.

OBJECTIVES:

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. Identify the Treble Clef, Bass Clef, and Grand Staff.
- 2. Identify notes of the Treble Clef and Bass Clef including ledger lines.
- 3. Identify sharps, flats, and natural symbols.
- 4. Analyze the relationship between half-steps and whole-steps and how they apply to scales, sharps. flats, naturals, and transposition on the piano keyboard.
- 5. Play triads and five-note major scale patterns in all twelve major keys.
- 6. Recognize rhythmic symbols and interpret them appropriately.
- 7. Practice strategies for quickly learning music.
- 8. Develop finger and hand independence as it relates to piano playing.
- 9. Develop fundamental technical skills for playing passages on piano.
- 10. Develop and use vocabulary specific to music and musical context.
- 11. Develop a repertoire of simple songs.

COURSE GRADING AND EVALUATION:

- ➤ <u>Weekly Skills/Reading Quizzes</u> 30% Quizzes will be held at the beginning of the first class meeting of the week and will alternate aural skills tests and oral skills tests. No makeups will be allowed without advance notice regarding an absence. One (1) quiz score will be dropped from the final grade
- ➤ Theory and Other Homework 15% Students will submit documentation of at least 100 minutes of lab work. Other written homework will be due at the start of class as assigned. Scores will be based on the percentage of minutes completed for the week. Students may also be assigned additional homework, exercises, or projects to support their piano development.
- Midterm Exams 20% There will be one midterm exam. It will consist of both an in class portion and a performance portion one. This will be specified on the course calendar.
- Final Exam/Recital Participation 35% The final for this course will include both an inclass portion and a recital. The in-class portion and of the final exam time for this course and the recital time will be TBA.

ATTENDANCE:

Attendance at all class sessions is required. This is a skill-based course that develops muscle memory over time. One cannot acquire classroom information and experience if he/she is not in attendance. Absences will be reflected in your final grade. *You will be allowed two (2) absences with no additional penalty than any zeros received on quizzes or exams*. After 2 absences, you will lose 5% off of your final grade for each absence. In serious, documented cases, a quiz may be made up in advance of an absence.

Assignments provide a means for you to practice the material covered in class and a means for your instructor to evaluate your proficiency with the material. Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date indicated. Late assignments will not be accepted. You are responsible for the work assigned in class even if you are absent. Quizzes provide a means for your instructor to test your comprehension of material covered in class. Quizzes are normally short and do not occupy the entire class meeting. Makeup quizzes will not be given.
