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Course Description: This course studies basic theories, research, concepts and principles of physical, emotional, cognitive and social development at each stage of life from conception through adolescence.

Course Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- A. Describe the developmental changes that take place in children with typical and atypical development from conception through adolescence in the areas of physical, psychosocial, cognitive, and language development.
- B. Identify the impact of biological, environmental, social, cultural, political, and nutritional factors on health and well-being of children and families.
- C. Analyze children's development based on various theoretical frameworks.
- D. Apply current theories of child development to assess children in all developmental domains.
- E. Identify those variables that lead to typical development and those that contribute to atypical development at various stages.
- F. Describe the importance of early development and the effects of genetic and environmental factors on development.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe development of children from conception through adolescence in the physical, social, emotional, and cognitive domains
- 2. Identify cultural, economic, political, and historical context that impact children's development
- 3. Apply knowledge of development and major theoretical frameworks to child observations.

Weekly Quizzes

You will have one or multiple quizzes per week. These can be found after every smaller lesson to help reinforce the content covered. The content within the quiz relates to the materials read/watched/reviewed in the module as well as any additional information I have directed you to read. The quiz could be multiple choice, short answer, T/F and/or matching. Make sure you are studying and reading each week. The quizzes are due the week they are assigned. **NO LATE QUIZZES**. The guizzes are NOT timed.

<u>Assignments</u>

Throughout the semester you will have assignments due that capture your learning related to the modules. The comprehensive directions for each assignment will be found in the assignment link itself.

Observations

- You will be required to complete 2 observations on a child from 2-7 years of age (observation must at least 1 hour).
- Observation 1 is pretty straightforward. Observation 2 requires some specifics and more reflection. Give yourself time to do each well.
- You may download the instructions for the observations and type directly into the form to help ensure that you have answered all the questions. (You will find this information in our 'Major Assignment" module.
- These observations are both due by November 27th but I highly recommend you start them earlier as you will probably have many assignments/midterms due around that time for other classes. Make arrangements to observe EARLY in the semester, especially if you are going to observe at the child development Lab school on campus. During peak times of the semester they may be overloaded with observers and tell you that they cannot accommodate you!

• You can observe the child of a friend or relative, or contact the Child Development Lab school at Clovis Community College and make arrangements to observe a child in the required age.

Make sure that you have read the modules and instructions pertaining to the observations. Don't go in 'cold' or you may have to go back to see all you need to see!

Attendance: Using Canvas

Utilizing Canvas is a **REQUIRED** component of this course. All course correspondence and material including (but not limited to) syllabus, assignments, and reading requirements will only be available through Canvas. All assignments must be completed within the Canvas system.

You should expect to spend 18-27 hours a week working on our course. Since ALL course content is only available online in Canvas this means you will spend 18-27 hours LOGGED in working on content.

Students must contribute to the course weekly through participation in discussion boards and quizzes. It is possible from my side to see your last login date. If you fail to log in and participate for 2 consecutive weeks you may be dropped from the course.

Late Assignments & Submitting Assignments

Late assignments will automatically lose 50% of the available points and must be turned in <u>within 7 days</u> after the due date. After 7 days the assignment will NOT be accepted. 
