## **Course Description**

This course consists of studies in technical, stylistic, and aesthetic elements of performing repertory from the standard vocal solo literature. Solo performance is required. Artistic self-expression will be developed through performance of the standard literature for solo voice. Baroque, classic, romantic, 20th century and world music literature will be assigned as appropriate to the student's development level. There will be weekly individual instruction designed to help transferring music majors pass vocal jury exams at four-year colleges and universities.

### **Course Content**

## **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Perform from the standard vocal solo literature in front of an audience, using appropriate recital performance practices.

## **Objectives:**

*In the process of completing this course, students will:* 

- 1. Perform in an artistic manner (including appropriate phrasing, musicianship skills, performance practice, and proper diction) at an intermediate/advanced level vocal repertoire appropriate for his/her particular voice in at least three languages (English, Italian, German, or French), from varying historical periods of classical music, and different world cultures demonstrating correct technical, aesthetic, and stylistic interpretation.
- 2. Demonstrate intermediate to advanced level in sight reading ability and in use of musical vocabulary learned in class.
- 3. Demonstrate skills necessary to participate in community ensembles.

## Course Expectations, Late Work, Visitors, and Extra Credit

- It is expected that students will attend all class sessions and participate fully. While this course is not evaluating singing skill level, it is evaluating pitch accuracy, which comes from muscle memory developed over time. Everyone will be singing in class regularly as well as in individual evaluations
- Late work and missed quizzes or exams will not be accepted without prior written consent of the instructor.
- Per the SCCCD policy, visitors (including children) are not allowed in classes without prior written consent of the instructor.
- Extra credit, while unusual, will be offered to every student in the class equally.

## **Course Grading and Evaluation**

- Written Work -20% This comes in a few forms:
  - o Repertoire Information Sheets Due for each piece assigned within two weeks of assignment.
  - <u>Listening Reflection Assignments</u> One listening reflection assignment will be assigned during the course of the semester. Forms will be provided to help in reflecting on what you are hearing. Due by Friday, March 29<sup>th</sup>.
  - <u>IPA</u> Various assignments in IPA will be assigned throughout the semester. This semester will focus
    on French IPA. Students taking four semesters of voice will cover all five of the major sung
    languages.
  - Presentations Each students will present a 5-10 minute presentation on a topic of their choosing related to the field of voice. Additionally, each student music lead warm-ups once during the semester. More information will be assigned.
- <u>Performances</u> 25% Students will learn and perform at least 3-5 pieces (depending on year and major) in various languages throughout the semester. Some will be long and some will be short, but ALL must be memorized. Failure to memorize pieces will result in an automatic grade reduction by 30%. There are three different performance categories required for this course:
  - O Students must perform at least twice in class
  - Students will perform in 2-3 (depending on year and major) of the Music Department Recitals on: Mondays February 25<sup>th</sup>, March 25<sup>th</sup>, and April 29<sup>th</sup>. Performance dates will be assigned throughout the semester.
  - o Students must perform at the Vocal Department Concert on Friday, May 10th or TBA.
- <u>Practice Logs</u> 20% Students will submit a detailed practice log each week detailing AT LEAST 100 minutes of independent practice time on their songs.
- Lesson Progress 20% Students will be evaluated at each lesson based upon the attached rubric.
- <u>Final Exam</u> 15% The final for this course will include both a written and performance portion. The written portion will on Wednesday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>, 12:00PM-1:50PM. The performance will take the form of a jury on Friday, May 17<sup>th</sup> time TBA.

Attendance - Attendance at all class sessions is required. This is a skill-based course that develops muscle memory over time. One cannot acquire classroom information and experience if he/she is not in attendance. Absences will be reflected in your final grade. You will be allowed 2 absences with no additional penalty than any zeros received on quizzes or exams. After 2 absences, you will lose 5% off of your final grade for each absence. In serious, documented cases, a quiz may be made up in advance of an absence. Failure to participate in a required performance may result in a failing grade. All absences for a required performance must be communicated via email to the director by the drop period Friday, February 1st.

Assignments provide a means for you to practice the material covered in class and a means for your instructor to evaluate your proficiency with the material. Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date indicated. Late assignments will not be accepted. You are responsible for the work assigned in class even if you are absent. Quizzes provide a means for your instructor to test your comprehension of material covered in class. Quizzes are normally short and do not occupy the entire class meeting. Makeup quizzes will not be given.
