Course Objectives: In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. recognize and identify target grammar structures in written language
- 2. read and analyze texts that include target grammar structures
- 3. demonstrate appropriate usage of target grammar structures in writing
- 4. identify and edit grammar errors in written language
- 5. analyze and edit grammar errors in their own writing
- 6. recognize and identify target grammar structures in oral language
- 7. listen to and analyze aural language that includes target structures
- 8. demonstrate the correct and appropriate use of target grammar structures in spoken language

Course Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. recognize intermediate grammar structures
- 2. demonstrate the appropriate use of intermediate grammar structures

**Grading**: This is a pass / no pass course. Current grades will be available to students throughout the semester on *Canvas*. Final grades will be calculated as follows:

**Homework:** Classroom and lab assignments are due by midnight on the date due unless stated otherwise. All assignments will be turned in electronically. <u>No credit will be given for homework turned in late</u>. Extra work or makeup work will not affect your grade.

**Projects:** Projects include writing, presentations, and other assignments that allow students to demonstrate the appropriate use of grammar structures.

**Unit Exams/ Final Exam:** The date for exams will be announced in advance. If you are absent on the day of an exam, <u>you will receive a zero score</u>. You are not allowed to take the exam on a later day unless you have made arrangements with the instructor **before** the exam. **Unit Exams** focus on the content of each unit. In addition, there will be a cumulative **Final Exam** covering all the units covered during the semester.

**PRIVACY:** Your work done in this class may be read by other students in this and future classes. This may include exchanging and reading papers for the purpose of review. This also may include projecting your work on the screen for the whole class to review. Choose writing topics that you are willing for others to read. Your class work will not be private.

**CHEATING AND PLAGIARISM:** You will receive no credit for an assignment or exam if in the opinion of the instructor you have cheated or plagiarized. You may be reported to the college for academic dishonesty.
