Spanish 2 Course Description (Catalog):

Spanish 2 is a second-semester course in conversational and written Spanish for non-native speakers designed to develop grammatical and conversational structures. Students will expand their vocabulary, improve their communication skills of standard Spanish, both oral and written. Further study of the cultures of Spain and Latin America and the Hispanic cultures of the US. Introduction to the literary text. (See pg. 10 of this syllabus for Student Learning Outcomes and Objectives as per the Reedley College Credit Course Outline, Spanish 2.)

Spanish 2 Course Description (for this particular section)

High-Beginning Spanish. This course stresses communication skills in Spanish. The goal is for beginning students to acquire conversational ability in Spanish. By the end of the semester you will have studied the past tenses, commands, and subjunctive forms, among other things; and will have had many opportunities to use those concepts in meaningful, interactive ways. In the process, the student will develop greater knowledge of the customs and various cultures that exist in the Spanish-Speaking world. You will not have developed that ability completely by the end of the semester, but you will be surprised at how many communicative skills you will have acquired!

Method of instruction: Daily activities, videos recording with grammar explanations and cultural segments will be available in <u>Vista Higher Learning</u> System. Some other course activities and assignment will be posted in Canvas. We will meet via Zoom two times during the semester for oral exams (half of the semester and of the end).


Specific course goals and objectives

1. Students will work on developing oral competence in the Spanish language through the use of communicative activities.

- 2. Students will develop knowledge of advanced grammatical structures such as "pretérito" and "imperfecto"
- 3. Students will develop greater knowledge of the customs and various cultures that exist in the Spanish-Speaking world.
- 4. Students will become competent writers using the Spanish language, and various creative-writing activities.

Required: Textbook (vtext) and Website

- Computer (desktop or laptop preferred method), iPad or smartphones could work as well, for most exercises.
- Webcam, microphone, and speakers or earphones/pods.

Drop and Attendance Policy

Do not wait until final grades have been posted to discuss missing assignments.

Announcements will be posted in Canvas on a regular basis. They will appear on your Canvas dashboard when you log in and/or will be sent to you directly through your preferred method of notification from Canvas. I will post the assignments for the following week every Friday afternoon along with a video announcement or short written message.

Tests and Grades: Your final grade will be based on the following elements:

Practice activities on Vista Higher Learning System + Cultural Section: Activities assigned in Vista Higher Learning represent 30 percent of your final grade. Activities are due at 11:59pm every Monday. You will be working with the Vistas Supersite Plus, and you are to submit the on-line assignments by the assigned due date. Exercises are done online and involve reading, audio and video-based materials. Your instructor collects the grades electronically. Most of the online exercises are scored immediately upon submission and you receive instant feedback on your work. If you receive a low score, you can re-do the exercise as many times as you wish until you earn a score you're satisfied with! Please note that there will be a late penalty for late submissions. *See handout on Canvas for more information on how to create your account and access to the course.

Exams: Five chapter tests will be given throughout the semester in Vista Higher Learning. These will be at the end of each lesson. See tentative schedule. NO MAKE-UP EXAMS ARE GIVEN. The tests may be written or oral or a combination of both- this will be announced ahead of time. Tests may be graded on selected items or all items.

Portfolio Assignments: Throughout the semester, you will be given portfolio assignments. These may include creating a booklet describing and illustrating a passage from your daily life, writing and illustrating a poem or short story, researching and presenting to class an aspect of the Hispanic culture, writing a movie critique etc. Deadline dates as well as further instructions will be provided throughout the semester on Canvas. Please refer to the policy for late assignments regarding any late work.

Final Exam: The final exam is not comprehensive; it will only cover Capítulo 11. It will be available in Vista Higher learning. The exam may be written or oral or a combination of both- this will be announced ahead of time. Exams may be graded on selected items or all items.

Activities on Canvas: There will be also activities on Canvas such as discussion boards and/or videos to watch.

Computer Readiness

- √ This is a 5-unit course and the workload reflects that you will be required to spend about 12.9 hours a week reviewing grammar tutorials and completing various activities online to reinforce what you are learning. You will also spend time completing compositions, discussions, exams, and preparing for presentations, and final exam; this will roughly require an additional 8 hours a week.
- ✓ All work in the Modules will be due every week on Monday at 11:59pm (except for the reply to your classmates which is due on Wednesdays).
- ✓ Be advised that the amount of time spent completing course work to successfully pass the class will vary from student to student depending on the level of experience with the language, the ability to learn a new language, and/or the experience the student has with web technologies and online courses.

VI. COURSE OUTCOMES:

- D. meet and get to know native speakers of Spanish through face-to-face contact, personal correspondence, the Internet, or travel.
- E. have a greater understanding and appreciation of the diversity of Hispanic cultures and the products of these cultures.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

In the process of completing this course the student will:

- A. understand and interact in simple spoken Spanish within the range of vocabulary topics and structures covered in this course.
- B. recognize and employ new vocabulary and grammatical structures in order to communicate ideas, both verbally and in writing, in the present and past tenses.
- C. understand and convey information and feelings in a given situation for a particular purpose.
- D. understand basic written texts using contextual clues, vocabulary recognition, grammar knowledge, cognates, and inferences.
- E. review, recall and use vocabulary and grammatical structures and concepts from Spanish 1.
- F. compare and contrast the target language and culture with the language and cultures of the U.S. and other countries.
- G. demonstrate a high beginner level of proficiency in the five skills as mandated by the competency guidelines of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL): comprehension, speaking, reading, writing and an understanding of the people and cultures of Spanish-speaking countries.
