Course Description:

In this course, we will be learning about the visual arts and their historical and cultural significance. We will be covering various types of media and movements from around the world and learn how to discuss these art forms through visual language. We will examine the relationships between artistic practices and belief systems and between institutional frameworks and individual creativity. The role of the artist, patrons, and viewer in relation to the work of art will also be topics covered.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of the visual vocabulary of art
- 2. Analyze the different types of media within a cultural and/or historical context.
- 3. Critique works of art within a cultural and/or historical context.

Course Objectives:

In the process of completing this course the students will:

- 1. Utilize basic knowledge of the visual arts, including architecture, crafts, drawing, film, digital/electronic media, painting, photography, printmaking, and sculpture.
- 2. Use knowledge of the elements and principles of design to further their understanding of art objects.
- 3. Distinguish the use of the various materials and techniques used by artists.
- 4. Interpret art based on an understanding of visual imagery, including the use of signs, symbols and metaphor.
- 5. Understand how context influences art and its evolution from past to the present.
- 6. Understand how art functions in society.
- 7. Interpret basic types of artists and artisans, including but not limited to Shaman, Classical, Folk, Guild, Individual, Modern, and Contemporary.
- 8. Articulate a visual and conceptual understanding of the major periods in art history.
- 9. Use an informed vocabulary to articulate an enhanced appreciation for art.

Attendance Policy:

Attendance is a bit different in an online class. I expect you to login and watch all lecture videos at least twice weekly and complete all assigned work by the due date. Your participation and your completion of assignments within each module is equivalent to your attendance.

Conduct Policy:

Students are expected to demonstrate respect for the instructor, other students, the classroom environment, and themselves. Students who are unable or unwilling to conduct themselves appropriately will be required to leave the class until such time that they can function maturely.

Communication Policy:

Please include your name and course number in all email communications. Please anticipate 48 hours for a reply during the week, though I will do my best to get back to you sooner. If I have not replied within 48 hours, assume that I have not received your message and reach out to me again.

Grading Policy:

Completion of all assignments, and other course requirements does not guarantee a passing grade. The amount of work, thought, and active participation you put forth will improve your grade.

Late Work Policy:

Exams: I will allow a student to reschedule an exam only when a written medical excuse is provided or, alternately, a written excuse of similar gravity. In the absence of such an excuse, missing an exam will lead to an automatic zero. There is no make-up final. If you miss the final, then you receive a zero.

Requests for excused extensions need to be made promptly and include written documentation. No approved late work will be accepted after the final exam.

Drop Policy:
