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### **Course Description:**

TWO-DIMENSIONAL DESIGN 3 units, 2 lecture hours, 4 lab hours. This course provides an introduction to the elements and principles of 2-dimensional design. Students create design projects with beginning level instruction in drawing, painting, collage, and mixed-media. (A, CSU, UC) (C-ID ARTS 100).

### **Course Statement:**

As an introduction to Two Dimensional Design this course will expose you to a number of different techniques, methods, and exercises in making art. We will achieve this as a class through a series of different projects and exercises. In this course those projects will address collage, a color wheel, still life, one and two point perspective, an artist book and portrait painting. Artist videos and lectures will be shown that detail the art historical importance of the projects. You will be working from home and will need to check in regularly to make sure that you are on track. The check ins will consist of submitting photos of work in progress on respective due dates. You will also be completing written responses on artist videos and providing feedback to your peers via discussion critiques.

### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Produce a body of work that demonstrates an understanding of 2D design principles and concept development strategies.
2. Further develop technical skills with tools and processes used with 2D media.
3. Develop the ability to express their ideas in critiques and in writing.
4. Demonstrate comprehension of the visual vocabulary of art.

### **Course Objectives:**

- Gain an understating of materials
- Expand knowledge of both contemporary and traditional art making styles
- Develop a knowledge of contemporary artists
- Expand ones art vocabulary
- Learn how to look and critique art work
- Think critically about one's own studio practice
- Learn basic color theory
- Learn how to make a book
- Learn how to develop ideas
- Gain an understating of composition
- Learn the elements of design

### **Required Materials:**

Materials can be purchased at Wal-Mart, Michaels, the school bookstore, Amazon, DickBlick, hardware stores, online or from your own supplies. Additional materials may be required as the

semester progresses.

### **Attendance Policy:**
