ECE-15- (55671): Parent Education—WEB

Course Description:

This course examines skills needed for effective parenting and the importance of nurturing young children. This course also addresses the explicit developmental needs of children and the use of effective communication skills. Positive discipline strategies will be explored as well as environmental influences on behavior.

Course Outcomes:

- 1. Recognize the developmental needs of children and utilize effective parenting tools to meet those needs appropriately.
- 2. Demonstrate effective parent-to-parent and parent-to-child communication skills.
- 3. Implement effective parenting tools in the context of cultural influence.

Required Text:

None. However, course material will be provided through the weekly modules utilizing Canvas. Students are responsible for reading all content provided by instructor.

Canvas Companion Course:

ASSIGNMENTS:

PowerPoint Presentation:

Students will chose a topic from one of the modules and complete a Powerpoint presentation on that topic. Presentations must be approximately 10 minutes and include 10-15 slides. Presentations will be submitted on line. Due dates to be determined.

Weekly Discussion:

Each week you will practice your observation and assessment skills through the discussion of specifically chosen video clips and reflection on material from the text. You will find specific corresponding questions each week for the video clip. Knowledge gained through the weekly readings must be demonstrated for full points. You can do this through referring to specific content from the text. In addition to creating an original thread in response to the video observation you will also respond to two peers. Discussion board posts are worth 20 points (15

for original post and 5 points for peer response). Posts include a written response to a prompt provided by Friday of each week. For full points, two peer responses must be submitted by Sunday, 11:55pm.

Module Quizzes:

There will be a weekly module quiz. Quizzes are not timed but must be completed in one sitting (you cannot save the quiz and come back to it later).

Weekly Reflection:

A weekly reflection on module material will be submitted by Sunday, 11:55pm. Instructions provided in module.
