Course Description

ESL 214LS is a listening and speaking course for ESL students who want to develop oral language skills at the high-intermediate level. Students learn to comprehend authentic lectures, talks and reports and effectively express ideas and points of view in spoken English on a variety of common academic topics. This course may be taken concurrently with other ESL 214-level courses. Successful completion of this course will prepare students for ESL 215LS or ESL 315LS. ADVISORIES: ESL 213LS or ESL 313LS, or placement through a multiple-measure process.

Course Objectives

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. follow the organization of academic lectures, take notes, and respond to questions.
- 2. effectively use English for discussion about academic topics, including inference and problem-solving.
- 3. prepare and deliver effective oral presentations, panel discussions and debates on academic topics and critically analyze their own presentations and those of classmates.
- 4. identify and use near native-like rhythm, intonation, and stress patterns in words and sentences

Course Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1.

- 1. listen and understand spoken academic English at the highintermediate level.
- 2. communicate orally on academic topics at the high-intermediate level.

Assignment Types

Assignments: This includes practice exercises, quizzes, and interactive activities to review what we are learning. Most assignments have rubrics on which your work is scored. All materials needed for these assignments will be located in the description boxes.

Recordings: This includes any audio or video that are submitted as assignments or on discussion boards. You will be graded with a rubric.

Conversation Partner Project (CPP): This semester, you will have the opportunity to meet once a week with another student online for a minimum of 30 minutes at least 6 times throughout the semester. At the end of each meeting, you will write a journal entry reflection about your meeting that you will submit to me. This is one of the most popular and enlightening parts of this course. You will get lots of practice speaking English. Some of you may even make a good friend in the process. I think you will be very happy with the results!

Oral Presentations / Interviews: You will be required to attend a scheduled meeting to give a prepared presentation or participate in a one-on-one interview.

Attendance Policy

Online learning requires regular attendance and participation, just as would be expected in a face-to-face environment. Since this is a synchronous course with a scheduled meeting time, you are required to attend the weekly Zoom meeting. I will record your attendance at these meetings. However, your attendance will be measured with the completion of your weekly assignments. Each week, you will be given a number of assignments. You will have 2 due dates per week. You can expect to spend anywhere from 6 - 9 hours on this course per week. You will need to submit at least one assignment in order to have your attendance recorded as present for that week. If you do not submit work, you will receive a message from me checking in on you.

The first assignment must be completed within the first week of the course. Failure to do so by **Friday**, **August 13th** will result in being dropped from the course as a "No Show."

If you do not submit work, you will receive a message from me checking in on you. If you miss one full week of assignments without contacting me, you may be dropped from the course. However, if you decide not to finish this class, you are responsible for dropping yourself. Otherwise, you may receive a failing grade for the class. If you are ill or unable to attend class for a short period of time, contact me immediately to let me know that you intend to remain in the class. The pace of an online course may be a big adjustment for you. If you ever begin to fall behind or are unable to complete work for the week, please contact me right away. We will work on a plan to get you caught up!

Drop Policy

Your first assignment is due on **Wednesday**, **August 11th.** Failure to complete the assignment will result in being dropped from the course. **I will drop anyone I have not heard from on Friday**, **August 13th as a "No Show."** You have work due each week. If you do not submit work, you will be marked absent. If you are absent for one whole week, you can expect a message from me to see if you need some assistance. If I do not get a response from you, I may complete an instructor drop so that you do not receive a failing

grade if you do not intend to take the course. Adding or dropping this class is your responsibility. Please find important drop deadline dates in the <u>syllabus</u>.

Late Work Policy

Please make every effort to submit your work on time. Assignments are due on or before the due date (see the class schedule for due dates). Assignments may be turned in ahead of time. I understand life can get busy and it may not always be possible for you to complete an assignment on time. I don't want you to get a poor grade in the class because of circumstances that are beyond your control. In this class, there is no penalty for submitting work late in this class, except for Discussions. I do not accept late discussion posts. I do, however, expect you to turn in all your work on time. It is important to note that assignments will close 72 hours after the due date. There will be various points throughout the semester in which all assignments re-open for you to submit any missing work.

If you are unable to submit an assignment on time, you must contact me **prior to the due date**. This is a **common courtesy** and **I expect you to do this out of respect** for me, the deadline, and the goals that I have previously set for you to stay on schedule for successfully completing this course. If you have a pattern of submitting late work, you can expect to receive a message from me. Your assignments have due dates to keep you on track in this class. The course is designed for you to complete work in the order I assign it so that your knowledge can build upon itself. If you start to fall behind, it can be extremely difficult to catch up and it may be impossible to complete the work. Please review all assignments and make note of their due date so you can create a plan to get them done.

Feedback Policy

I will return all graded assignments back to you within a week of the time of submission. For some assignments, such as discussions or recordings, I will provide comments in Canvas responses.
