COUN 283 #56205– Parenting Strategies and Healthy Family Relationships

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Class dates: January 12, 2021 - March 12, 2021

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course examines the importance of family relationships and helps identify strategies that can lead to positive changes within the family. Students will learn strategies for effective parenting, effective communication, stress and anger management, domestic violence resolution, and personal boundary maintenance.

COURSE OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, student will be able to:

- 1. Describe the characteristics of healthy family relationships and effective positive communication skills within the family unit.
- 2. Compare and contrast effective parenting styles and list the developmental needs of children.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. Discuss the characteristics of a healthy family and the developmental needs of children.
- 2. Review and practice strategies for parenting with love and logic.
- 3. Examine individual parenting styles.
- 4. Identify strategies that promote positive changes in families.
- 5. Identify own personality types and examine how to communicate effectively with other personality types.
- 6. Identify and employ strategies for effective communication and reduced conflict.
- 7. Identify positive guidance techniques for discipline.
- 8. Review and employ strategies for managing anger.
- 9. Recognize the signs of domestic abuse and learn effective safety planning strategies.

Incidents of cheating and plagiarism may result in any of a variety of sanctions and penalties, which may range from a failing grade on a particular examination, paper, project, or assignment in question to a failing grade in the course, at the discretion of the instructor and depending on the severity and frequency of the incidents.
