The History of Cinema: 1960-present

Class Description:

This course is a survey of significant films and advances in the creation, reception and influence of cinema from 1960 to the present. We will examine the international reach and commercial success of the film industry, the domination and influence of Western films around the world during this period. We will also examine filmic conventions and advancements of narrative and documentary film and how film is used as a political argument or as indoctrination. Analyses will include varying film criticisms from feminist to Marxist to reception theory, among others.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- 1. Identify significant films in the development of cinematic techniques and appeal since the 1960s.
- 2. Recognize film's broad reach.
- 3. Identify editing techniques such as montage or flashback, and film angles, common genres such as the Western or science fiction; and basic Holly wood-type conventions.
- 4. Analyze parody and revision of genres with respect to a film's commercial and social context.
- 5. Demonstrate through personal analysis of assigned films the fundamental elements of film form and style.
- 6. Report in chronological order the main currents film history from 1960 to present.
- 7. Analyze films and filmic techniques from diverse interpretative angles such as Marxist, feminist, mythopoetic or deconstructionist, and artistic value vs. commercial viability.
- 8. Chart an overview of political tensions both in the production and dissemination of foreign and domestic films.

Required Texts and Materials:

Links will be provided to free online materials. Other materials will be posted in the modules.

An Amazon and/or Netflix account is useful but not required. I provide all of the films; however, I have a mediocre laptop and you will find better quality on Amazon, Netflix or other streaming services.

Communication:

I communicate with the class in three ways:

- 1. The Announcement feature. This is the primary way I communicate with the class. I leave all announcements up for the entire semester, so if you forget something and cannot find the announcement in your email, it is always available to you there.
- 2. Canvas email. If I need to reach out to you individually, I will send an email through Canvas.
- 3. Gradebook responses. This is the place I will respond to your forum posts and your essays.

Decorum & Policies:

College is a professional environment. Therefore, I expect to be addressed as Professor Watts or Ms. Watts when you initiate an email conversation. Once the conversation has begun, then you do not need to repeat that. Always put your topic in the subject line.
