SPANISH 4NS – Spanish for Native Speakers Spring 2021 - Section 59347 and 59348 – 5 Units - Online



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Course Description.

This is a second-semester course in Spanish for bilingual or monolingual native speakers designed to develop reading and writing skills. Students will further develop and improve skills in standard Spanish that include exercises in grammar and vocabulary building, and research projects. This will be achieved through readings of social modern topics, historical culture and literary texts that are the center of class discussions. ADVISORIES: English 1A or 1AH. (A, CSU-GE, UC, I) (C-ID SPAN 230). The course is taught entirely in Spanish. Some of the instructions on Canvas will be in English for clarification. **This is not a self-paced course**. All assignments are to be completed no later than 11:59 pm on the date indicated. We will use Email, Zoom and Canvas as our Management Learning System to communicate.

Who is a Heritage Speaker? "a student who is raised in a home where a non-English language is spoken, who speaks or merely understand the heritage language and who is to some degree bilingual in English and the heritage language" (Valdés, 2001).

Student Learning Outcomes.

- ✓ recognize and display comprehension of Spanish spoken by native speakers of the language at the high intermediate level.
- ✓ produce accurate and clear language that demonstrates standard usage of vocabulary, grammar, and idioms of native speakers.
- ✓ read, paraphrase or summarize to demonstrate comprehension of a variety of written works, such as short stories, poetry, novels, magazines, newspapers, and multi-media materials.
- ✓ construct and compose paragraphs and/or short essays in standard Spanish that express ideas in a coherent and logical manner, by applying the correct usage of grammatical structures, vocabulary and idioms used by native speakers.
- ✓ identify and distinguish differences and similarities between Hispanic cultures and demonstrate a deeper understanding and appreciation of these cultures and their products

Course Objectives.

- ✓ read, comprehend, and analyze stories, poems, and essays in Hispanic and U.S. Latino literature
- ✓ compose and organize in a variety of modalities in Spanish: simple paragraphs, personal letters, and descriptive and reflective essays.
- ✓ understand thoroughly historic and contemporary Hispanic and U.S. Latino culture.
- ✓ understand what "standard" Spanish means and when it is used.
- ✓ summarize, analyze, and evaluate selected Spanish language readings samples.
- ✓ identify interference from English.
- ✓ develop the analytical and thinking skills appropriate to analyzing essays and evaluating research by discussing readings.
- ✓ demonstrate a high-intermediate level of competency in the five skills as mandated by the proficiency guidelines of the American Council of the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL): listening comprehension, speaking, reading, writing and an understanding of the people and cultures of Spanish-speaking countries.

Students should keep a calendar to keep track of their academic progress and manage their study time properly. We will cover chapters 7through 12.



Learning Management System – Canvas>Inbox

- ✓ We will communicate mainly through Canvas. The entire curriculum for this course has been organized on Modules following this syllabus as the main guide. After checking for new announcements, students should go directly to Modules and see what is pending.
- ✓ Students can send messages by clicking on 'Inbox' from the navigation menu. Messages and emails will be checked frequently Monday through Friday and responded within 24 hours. - ✓ You will have unlimited attempts in each activity. This gives you the opportunity to practice as much as you need and obtain a high score. The activities are due at 11:59 pm.
- ✓ There will be a penalty for late submissions. Students will be given plenty of time to complete lab assignments. There is no excuse for missed or late homework.
- ✓ The lab is worth 10 points per chapter. We will cover chapters 7-12.
- ✓ Important: Pay close attention to punctuation *No acentos, no points*.



Exams.

- ✓ The exams will be posted on Canvas after completing each chapter. There will be some exams posted on the MySpanishlab calendar. Details for each exam will be posted on Canvas. Check the **General Tentative Schedule** at the end of this syllabus for detailed assignments.
- ✓ The exams will be 1 hr 1 attempt No late submissions accepted.
- ✓ Makeups There will be one makeup opportunity for one exam, one quiz at the end of the semester. The date will be posted on Modules.



Discussion Boards - Netiquette

- ✓ Discussion Boards count as being present in class and actively participating. This is how you will get to know your classmates, share your opinions, esperiences, motivate and support other students with your creative responses.
- ✓ There will be a weekly Discussion Board (foros de discusión). Details will be posted on Modules.
- ✓ Be respectful and mindful when you post. Disrespect or sarcasm will not be tolerated.
- ✓ Remember, write full sententes. You are not texting, no abbreviations, please.
- ✓ A quality post is one that moves the discussion forward and gives room for more comments. Show your personality style and motivation level. *Be unique, be yourself!*
- ✓ One or two liners do not constitute a quality post -5-10points will be deducted.




Compositions.

Oral Presentations.

- ✓ Students will be assessed during a mid-term and final oral presentation.
- ✓ Students are required to demonstrate oral proficiency in the Spanish language without reading or using notes. Details will be posted on Canvas.
